KILLED BY C. P. R.

Imperial Limited in Collision at Grasset—No Passengers Hurt.

Grasset, Ont., Sept. 1.—The Imperial Limited, on the Canadian Pacific, met with a very serious head-on collision three and a half miles west of here, at 8.30 o'clock yesterday morning, caused by a light engine and a passenger train.

Fireman P. Moran, who started to jump from his engine, was caught between the engine and tender, which instantly killed him. Engineer McMahon stayed with his engine until he had reversed the ponderous machine and applied the air brakes. By that time it was too late to get clear of his engine.

Winnipeg, Sept. 1.—Brakeman Wilson was fatally injured at Ochre River, Man., by falling between cars and fracturing his skull. His wife resides in Toronto.

WAR IS INEVITABLE

Bulgaria and Turkey Bound to Fight in the Course of Time.

EVENTS WILL FORCE THEM.

Revolution is Spreading—Fifteen Thousand Insurgents are Under Arms—General Rising This Week—Famous Leader, Sarafoff, Assumes Control in the Salonica District—Villages Burned.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Sept. 1.—Both in official and revolutionary circles the opinion is freely held that war between Turkey and Bulgaria is imminent and can be averted by nothing short of a miracle. It is not expected that either government will formally declare hostilities, but that the prevailing conditions will force a war.

Up to 6 o'clock last evening Prince Ferdinand had not arrived in Sofia, and the court officials declare that they are without information as to his movements. General Rising This Week. Sofia, Sept. 1.—The Macedonian leaders claim that an aggregate of 2,000 Bulgarians have crossed the frontier in small parties and joined the insurgents during the past ten days.

Salonica, Sept. 1.—The Turks have occupied Klissura, Albania, without resistance. A number of Bulgarian villages in its vicinity were burned. Inspector-General Hilmi Pasha recently sent a communication, composed of five Christians and five Turks, to offer amnesty to the insurgents on condition that they lay their arms before the great fast today in honor of the Sultan's coronation.

Traced to London Town. Aden, Arabia, Sept. 1.—The principal sources for the supply of rifles and ammunition to the Mad Mullah's forces in Somaliland have been traced through a complete identification of trade marks by agents at Haraar and Jibutul, Abyssinia, to a London firm. Since the commencement of the operations in Somaliland an aggregate of 8,000,000 rounds of Lee-Enfield rifle ammunition and correspondingly large numbers of Lee-Enfield and Gras rifles have been shipped by this London firm to Jibutul and Haraar, by way of Manchester and Marseilles.

A NELSON DROWNING. Mr. Edward Grier, a Brother of Mayor Grier of Owen Sound. Owen Sound, Sept. 1.—Mayor W. A. Grier received a telegram last evening, stating that his brother, Mr. Edward Grier, had been drowned at Nelson, B. C., and that the body had not been recovered. The victim of the accident is an Owen Sound boy. He was a manufacturing jeweler, and for a time was in business in this town in the firm of Grier & Taylor. Wm. Guertin Drowned. Ottawa, Sept. 1.—On Saturday at noon at the Cascades, on the Gatineau, Wm. Guertin of River Desert, aged twenty, lost his life. When dinner bell rang ten men got into one boat with Guertin. The boat struck a rock, swung into the swift current, and was swamped. Guertin was the only one drowned, the others being rescued.

Reduced Wheat Freight Rates. Winnipeg, Aug. 31.—(Special).—For ten cents per hundred pounds, or six cents per bushel, wheat is now carried from Winnipeg to Port Arthur over the Canadian Northern Railway. An equal reduction in rates goes into effect to-morrow at all other points on the Canadian Northern in Manitoba. This makes a total reduction in rates secured by the Roblin Government on grain alone of four cents per hundred within three years. E. A. James, Gen.-Supt. of the Canadian Northern Railway Company, interviewed, he said: "The new rate fixed by the Order-in-Council of the Provincial Government will go into effect to-morrow (Tuesday) morning. All of our agents were notified this afternoon."

Newbury, Sept. 1.—A very sad accident occurred here last evening when Herbert Teller, a man of this vicinity, lost his life. Mr. Teller was returning from the Wabash employees' excursion yesterday, and alighting from his train stepped directly in front of the Grand Trunk westbound express, which killed him instantly. The entire train passed over his body. Dr. Walker of Glencoe declared an inquest unnecessary. Killed by a Train. Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 1.—Miss Sheardown, sister of S. Sheardown, farmer, near Hamlets, Man., killed herself yesterday afternoon in town. She placed her head on a rail in front of a moving train and her head was severed from her body. She had been despondent of late.

AGAINST OSLER, M.P.

Charged That He Profited by Government Concessions.

THE GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC.

Mr. Scott's Speech During This Debate Was Enlivened by His Statement That Osler, M.P., Was One of a Body of Crafters Who Cleared \$15,000,000 Out of Late Government Concessions.

Ottawa, Sept. 1.—When the House resumed yesterday morning Sir Wilfrid Laurier answered the question on the order paper in the name of Mr. Bourassa, as to whether Lord Minto had represented the opinion of his advisers, or was he speaking on his own responsibility when he addressed the recent banquet at Montreal, on trade matters. Sir Wilfrid's reply was: "His Excellency attended the banquet as the guest of the Montreal Board of Trade, and in answer to the toast expressed his own personal views."

Dr. Sproule (East Grey) drew attention to a despatch stating that anthrax had broken out in a herd of cattle west of Chicago. He said that as there were large shipments of western cattle sent through Canada over the Grand Trunk Railway he desired to draw the attention of the Minister of Agriculture to the possible danger that existed. Mr. Thomas Murray, of Pontiac, followed Dr. Vroman and spoke for the Government in the railway debate yesterday morning. In reply to Col. Hughes, he said, that he was retiring from the House of Commons, but not to the Senate.

Charge Against Mr. Osler, M.P.

That Mr. E. B. Osler, M.P., was one of a body of "crafters" who cleared \$15,000,000 out of concessions by the late Government to two western railways was the charge made in the House last night by Mr. Walter Scott, the member for Regina. This statement, which Mr. Scott repeated on his responsibility as a member, was given in some detail in the course of a very vigorous speech on the railway resolution. He said that what with bonuses and land grants given by the Conservative Government, and the difference between the stock and bond issue and the actual cost of the roads, there was that large profit for the promoters. The railways concerned are the Calgary & Edmonton and the Qu'Appelle, Long Lake & Saskatchewan. Mr. Scott, in the latter part of his speech, presented the case of the west with vigor for upwards of two hours, enlarging on the needs of more railway accommodation and of the loss which its absence had entailed. Mr. Scott's speech showed careful preparation, was delivered with fluency and force, and added materially to the reputation of the member for West Assiniboia as a debater. There were eleven speakers in the debate yesterday, including Messrs. Vroman, Murray, Fringle, MacLaren (Huntington), Gargill, Parmelee, Ball, Birkett, Belandier and Stewart. Some ten or twelve minutes, but the end is expected to-night.

ALASKAN PREPARATION.

Canadian Counsel Issue Statement, But Express No Opinion. London, Sept. 1.—Lord Chief Justice Alveston, the British member of the Alaskan Boundary Commission, called on Edith Root yesterday morning, and Ambassador Choate called on him later. John W. Foster, former Secretary of State, saw Mr. Choate during the afternoon, and they discussed the final arrangements for the meeting of the Commission at the Foreign Office Thursday.

Ottawa, Sept. 1.—The following cablegram has been received here from Hon. Clifford Sifton, who left New York on the 25th August in the Kaiser Wilhelm: "Lizard Station, Cornwall, Aug. 30.—All well. Reach Plymouth to-night. Splendid passage. (Signed) Sifton."

MEMBER FOR MONTMAGNY.

Ottawa, Sept. 1.—Pierre R. L. Martineau, M.P. for Montmagny, died yesterday afternoon in the Water street Hospital as a result of blood poisoning following other sickness. He had been in the hospital less than a week. His wife was at his bedside when death came. He was born at St. Francois, Montmagny, in 1857, and was a lawyer by profession. He succeeded Judge Choquette as member for Montmagny, being first elected in December, 1898. In 1900 he defeated A. Bernier by 213 majority. Land Seeker Murdered. Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 1.—Indians discovered the murdered and mutilated body of a Swedish land seeker near the Indian reserve at MacLeod on Saturday evening. No clue to identification has been found.
