

THE SAME THINGS AGAIN.

But we find in 1904 this same friend in the same confidential relations with the minister. We find him again distributing money to local operators, who thrust two or three dollar bills into the pockets of electors to induce them to vote for the minister of finance. We observe that this friend disappears when the election trials comes on and cannot be tained as a witness There is doubt that as a sequel to the elec-
