Meeting No 2 Held by Liberals on Saturday

The Liberals of Victoria and Haliburton held a meeting in the Academy of Music on Saturday afternoon to choose a candidate for the coming election to oppose Colonel Hughes.

The feature of the convention was the tameness. In the absence of President Dr. Blanchard, on a professional call, Dr. Giles, of Haliburton, was appointed chairman.

Secretary Fox first explained what work had been done, and what still remained to be done. He referred to the nomination of Dr. Giles and his resignation.

Dr. Wilson thanked the convention for selecting him candidate. He had not sought the position, and when the subject had been broached to him it had brought out the persuasion.

He had not come to make a speech. He had been very busy. However, there was fortunately no need of speaking to the men before him. Their politics were settled, and he could say nothing to make them better.

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ELDON FAIR DECIDED SUCCESS --- LARGE CROWD AND GOOD EXHIBITS

The Eldon Agricultural Society opened its gates Friday at Woodville for the forty-seventh time and there was nothing lacking that would in any way contribute to the success of the opening.

The whole countryside was present in gala attire, and in fact the young men and women were present in large numbers. The schools were closed, and the youngsters thronged the exhibition grounds.

The outstanding point about the crowds at the fair is the air of quiet prosperity everywhere observable. Eldon township, one of the best in the province, has apparently not suffered, or rather the people have not apparently suffered from the recent much-talked-of money stringency.

The weather was a real help. It was a fine heavy team and a good old Mr. D. L. Williams, of Sonys, had a team of heavy bay mares on the grounds in harness.

In cattle, Mr. John Campbell, of Fairview farm, Eldon, was the chief exhibitor, and he had thirteen head of cattle entered. They were prize winners.

Among the judges were: Cattle, Andrew Braden, of Bobcaygeon; draught horses, Wm. Bradie, of Stouville; poultry, L. J. Cameron, of Beaverton; sheep and swine, Isaac Naylor, Islay; light horses, Bert Weese, Lindsay; road horses, John Torrie, of Arville.

The show itself was the best in the history of the Society. The exhibits were better in the hall and there were more entries in the live stock classes.

It has been said that Woodville is dead, especially since local option came into force, but if so, the town is better off, judging from the scene presented at the fair grounds yesterday. The crowd was larger than it has been for years.

The Woodville brass band was on the grounds and discoursed to those present. They were not stinting in their numbers and the variety was also very good.

Mr. Wallace Lamb, of Lindsay, was present with his moving picture show and for a time did a rushing business, but a lack of alms there was a mishap. When the hurricane blew the large tent heaved, poised gracefully about a foot off the ground and then toppled over, with the audience inside.

The speeding-in-the-ring events, as usual, attracted the attention of the throng, and they thoroughly enjoyed the six heats. The races were fairly interesting, there being two or three very exciting heats.

The meeting closed with a number of well resounding cheers that fairly tore the roof off the Opera House, and made the welkin ring.

One of the oldest and most respected residents of the county passed away last evening in the person of the late George Ray. Death took place at deceased's late home on Victoria-ave., and followed an illness extending over a year.

Mr. P. B. St. John, of Sunderland, acted as starter, and Messrs. Duncan, McCrae and timekeeper. Both acted in the capacity as judges as well.

The Warder representative first visited the exhibition hall. Here everything was spic and span, and was a splendid exhibit of grain and roots. Pumpkins and other garden products were also much in evidence.

There was a great showing of horses, of all classes, and many were of the very best. Those Crawford, of draught class, and Messrs. Jax, Dixon and S. Murchison, of Woodville, entered horses in the agricultural class.

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A feature advertised for the afternoon's amusement was the baseball match between the crack teams from Hartley and Manilla, and was eagerly looked forward to by all in attendance.
