6,000 ON GROUNDS.

Nearly six thousand people thronged the fair grounds during Friday. The exact figures supplied by Ticket-seller W. Galbraith and his helpers are 5,386.

Of that number the adults were predominant, there being nearly 4,842 adult tickets sold. 499 ten cent tickets were sold, and 95 fifteen cent ones.

The sale from these tickets totalled about \$1,273, which is about a hundred dollars better than last year for the same day. Last year over \$1,100 was taken in at the big gate the first day.

Mr. Galbraith had several assistants and it kept them hustling to handle the crowd at times. After the bulk of the crowd had passed in the ticket sellers were put to work counting money and the green backs were everywhere.

A seven-year-old boy named Murray Johnston was shot and killed by his little sister, aged five, at Bagot, Man.
