

Four Stratton Voters Were Paid Two Dollars Per Head

Peterboro, Sept. 28.—Four witnesses, Arthur Alsept, Mark Harland, James Monger, and William Ashley, told about getting two dollars each at the Liberal committee rooms on election day, at today's session of the trial of the election protest against J. R. Stratton. Monger was not allowed to tell his story, owing to an objection from Mr. Watson, counsel for Mr. Stratton. Alsept and Harland had heard that money was being given away at the Liberal rooms, and went around to get two dollars. They said the money had nothing to do with their voting, and they did not know why it was given them. Both witnesses afterwards signed declarations that they had received no money. They did this on being asked to do so by some of Mr. Stratton's workers. Alsept said he was told he would get two years in prison if he did not sign it.

MONEY PUT UNDER BOOKCASE.

Alsept did not know why the money was given to him. Mark Harland said: "I voted and I received \$2 from Mr. Leary. I was paid up at the time. Witness stated he got his money from under a cardboard box on the table in the small committee room. Mr. Leary wrote his name on the cardboard box and

put the bill under the lid."

HEARD MONEY WAS BEING PAID

He was given to understand that money would be paid for votes. Witness told Mr. Watson he did not vote for money. He received the money after he had voted. Somewhat contradictory sounded the statement that the witness made when he said to Mr. Watson that before he voted he had given no promise or had no understanding that he was to get money for voting for Mr. Stratton. He had heard of the money part of the affair after he had voted.

In the smaller room in the committee rooms Mr. Leary asked Harland his name. The latter told him. The witness said, "He put a two-dollar bill under the lid of the cardboard box, and I picked it up. He told me to take it."

John Pritchard said he was at the Liberal rooms, but had not been given any money. He was asked to make an affidavit that he knew nothing improper in connection with Mr. Stratton's election, but had refused to do so.

James Monger said he was at the Liberal committee rooms on election day, and received \$2.

Mr. J. P. Cockburn died at Grayhurst.

Body of A. McDonnell Found in Scugog

Monday night searchers discovered the body of Angus McDonnell, the young man who has been missing since Saturday night, in the Scugog river, at the foot of St. Paul-st. and opposite east Kent-st. The body had been in the water for some time and life had long since been extinct.

The young man had not been seen since Saturday night at about ten o'clock. The theory is that he accidentally fell down the embankment on his way home, while walking along the railway track, and went into the river. Probably he cried for help and in the darkness and at night no one heard the cries.

HAT WAS FOUND.

The finding of the missing man's hat floating in the river on the south side where the floating bridge is placed during the winter, was the first clue as to the whereabouts of McDonnell. The find was made by Miss Squires, who saw the name in the christy and reported the matter to a son of Mr. William Cooney of her finding the hat and young Cooney notified the brothers and friends, who at once commenced a search and the river was dragged. Finally, about half past ten o'clock the body was located on the opposite side of the river, about twenty feet from the shore.

NO INQUEST.

An inquest was deemed unnecessary by the coroner, Dr. Blanchard, as the cause of death was clear and no foul play evident.

Angus McDonnell was twenty-three years of age and is a native of Lindsay, living here all his life. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Allen McDonnell, are still living and his brothers and sisters are: Joseph and Ronald, and Miss Georgina, of Lindsay and Mrs. Tobin, of Peterboro. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved family.

SAW HIM SUNDAY.

Mr. John Cote reported to Chief Vincent that he was talking to the late Angus McDonnell on Sunday night. This upsets the theory that it was on Saturday he fell into the river. McDonnell was not at home on Saturday night at all.

The bodies of the Gilding brothers, who were drowned in Toronto a week ago, were recovered.

Presentment of the Grand Jury

May it please your Lordship, the Grand Jurors of our Sovereign Lord the King, assembled at the sittings of the High Court of Justice for the County of Victoria, beg to make their presentment as follows:

They have been required to give consideration to a charge of murder, but no other case has been called to their attention.

They have visited the county jail and found the building a premises in a satisfactory condition. There are six persons, five males and one female, at present deprived of their liberty. They regret to find two insane persons confined in the prison awaiting removal to a hospital for such cases. The only justification for the presence of these persons under the law as it now exists, is that they cannot safely be detained elsewhere; the cause for regret in this connection is that they could not be admitted immediately to one of the Provincial institutions.

It is gratifying to be informed that since their visit, orders have been received for the instant removal of the insane woman to the asylum at Mimico.

They have visited the House of Refuge, and their observation of the conditions existing in the institution leads them to express high commendation of the manner in which it is managed and the care that is bestowed upon the large number of inmates, fifty-seven in all.

Big Shipment of Mica From North

Mr. H. G. Chamberlain, general manager of the Toronto Mica Company, and president and general manager of the Mica Products Company, of New York, passed through here Friday on his way to his mica mines located at Tory Hill, Ontario, from which point two carloads of mica have been shipped to his Toronto factory during the last few days. It is said by those who understand mica that this is the largest single shipment of mica that has ever been shipped in Canada at one time.

Mr. Chamberlain owns and controls some 2100 acres of mica property in Canada, not mentioning his holdings in iron, copper, graphite and some silver. It is understood that two of his most trusted men left for Cobalt on the 22nd to secure for him a valuable silver claim which is said to be nearly three inches wide, native silver, and better than 60 feet in length. His various interests are keeping him on the jump.

THE TRANSCONTINENTAL

WORK ON ABOVE RAILWAY PROGRESSES RAPIDLY.

The steel has been put down for 40 miles west of Cochrane on the Transcontinental Railway and will be extended twenty miles further within the next thirty days.

Two temporary bridges had to be built, the permanent steel structure will be put in place during the winter. The grade practically completed for 100 miles west of Cochrane.

East of Cochrane contractors have had some trouble with a coffer dam at the Abitibi where the high bridge is to be built.

Because there is no temporary structure here the contractors, Foley Walsh and Stuart, are now engaged cutting out a tote-road sixty-five miles long through the forest north-east of Lake Abitibi. Across this lake and over this new made trail they will carry supplies during the winter. These supplies will be cached at intervals along the line for use when spring opens again. About sixty miles of the first 100 miles of grade has been completed. The steel is down and the track is being belasted for the first eight miles east of Cochrane to the Abitibi River.
