SNAPS FROM THE GENERAL CONFERENCE AT VICTORIA

A copy of the General Conference Daily Bulletin, published at Victoria B.C., has been received at The Warder. It is a journal of eight pages devoted specially to the proceedings of the General Conference session of the Methodist church, which is being held in that city, and was mailed to this office by Mr. Wm. Suggitt, of Valentia, who is a delegate to the conference. The journal is nicely gotten up and printed on good quality paper. It publishes many phases of the big convention that are not to be found in the daily press of Ontario.

The delegation from the General Assembly of the Presbyterian church was introduced by Rev. Dr. Carman, who said, "Here are men of stability of faith and of love. They bare Presbyterians and that is saying a great deal." In reply Rev. Dr. Campbell welcomed them in fitting terms, saying, "You are the wise men from the east."

Rev. Chancellor Burwash, S.T.L., Rev. W. H. Emsley, F. E. O'Flynn and W. Ross, represented the Bay of Quinte Conference on the committee considering the expediency of having more than one General Superintendent.

Mr. F. A. McDiarmid, formerly of Lindsay, but now city solicitor of Victoria, was a member of the civic deputation to address the conference welcoming the ministers to the City of Victoria.

Rev. Thos. Manning, formerly of Lindsay, moved that the "Conference expresses its great pleasure in receiving a deputation from the Women's Missionary Society."

A number of the laymen and preachers enjoyed a quiet nap during the reading of the minutes of the various meetings of the General Conference Special Committee during the quadrennium, soothed to rest by the musical voice of the Secretary.

The Venerable Superintendent touched a deep chord in many hearts when he said, "My personal interests are not a chaff in the wind. I'm not the man you are to look after. Seek me in a thousand oblivions if you will protect the Methodist Church or you are faithless men."

An unique incident of the Confer-

ence was the presentation of a cane to the General Conference by the Rev. Dr. Robson. The cane is made from the "oak" of the steamship "The Beaver," the first steamship to cross the Pacific and on which the first Methodist Missionaries were brought to the province, and of "teak" from India. The request of Dr. Robson was that a gold band be put on the cane and that it be suitably inscribed, and sent forward with an address to His Majesty King George V. The Conference accepted the gift and referred the carrying out of the request of Dr. Robson to a committee.

Among the newspaper men who are attending the Conference are Mr. M. A. James of the Bowmanville Statesman, Mr. H. F. Moore of the Acton Free Press, Mr. W. H. Kerr of the Brussels Post, Mr. O. M. Alger of the Tweed News, and they have all been active workers in the Sunday School. Dr. H. Hough, of Toronto, is an ex-editor.
