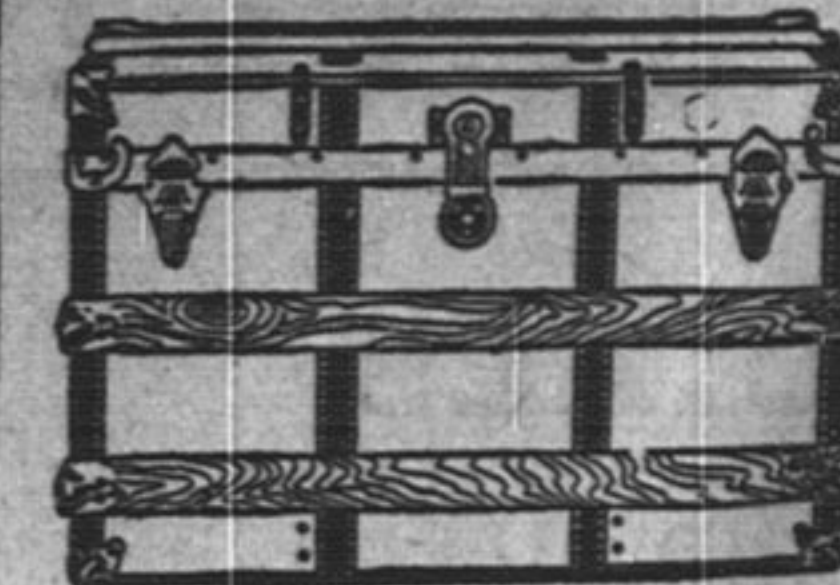

**C.P.R. MAY BUILD.**  
Toronto, Aug. 24.—It is rumored that the Canadian Pacific is to build a new line from Smith's Falls to Toronto, and that the survey has already been made from Belleville to this city. The new road will branch off the present Smith's Falls-Peterboro route at either Perth or Bathurst. It will then run southwest across the country to Belleville, through a territory as yet untouched by railway. From Belleville it will come into Toronto along the lake front, parallel with the Grand Trunk.

No official confirmation of the report could be secured in Toronto. One official said that he had not heard of it, but that is not unnatural, for all such plans and surveys are made from the Montreal end of the line.

"I do know, however," said the official, "that the road is to be double tracked from Perth to Bathurst."

Bathurst is a short distance west of Perth, and this double tracking lends support to the new line theory and to the rumor that it is going to branch on at Bathurst.

The towns along the lake front would be delighted to hear that they were to have a competitive line. Several years ago the C.P.R. were considering the project of building along the shore, but the scheme was abandoned.

For the last few months it has been current that the C.P.R. was going to double its line from here to Peterboro, but it is more probable now that it will build an entirely new line.
