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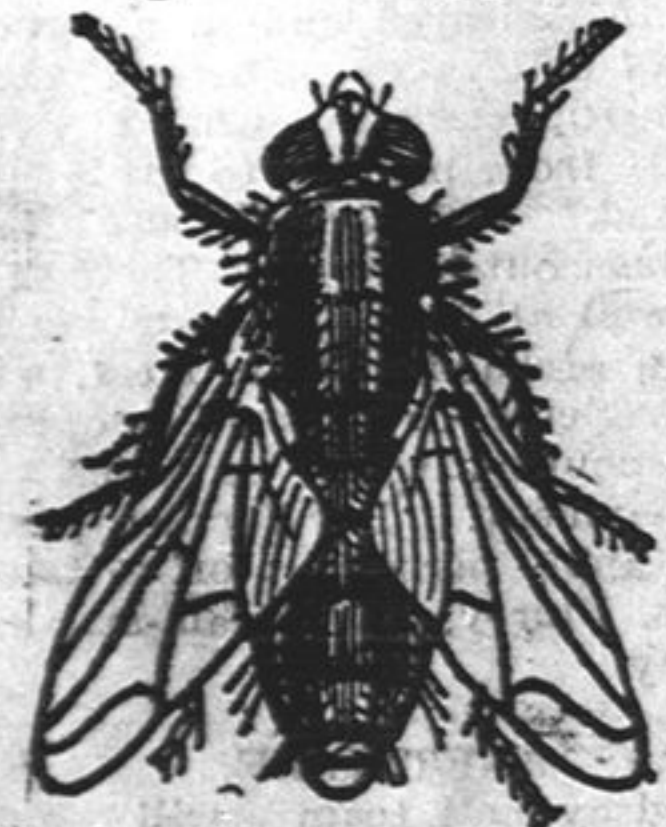

McLeod in the chair, Councillors Galloway, Staback, Alton and Becroft present, with Clerk J. C. Gilchrist. Minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed. Capt. N. L. Patterson waited on the council on behalf of the Eldon Agricultural Society, and after a short discussion Councillor Becroft moved, seconded by Councillor Alton, that a grant of \$25 be given. Carried. Moved by Coun. Galloway, seconded by Coun. Becroft, that the account of Wm. McKee for \$36.87 be paid.—Carried. Moved by Coun. Staback, seconded by Coun. Alton, that the bill of D. Campbell, re Dobson for lights, be paid.—Carried. The board of health then presented the following bills re scarlet fever case at Art Pettick's: Dr. McKay, \$5.45; Dr. Grant, \$30.50; Dan McLachlan, \$8.07; J. Murchison, \$2.21; Wm. Trethewey, \$3.35; J. J. Ruan, \$2.90; S. Paed, \$3.70; Peter Deguerre, \$3.43; S. Dumond, \$28.50. Moved by Coun. Staback, seconded by Coun. Alton, that the bills be paid.—Carried. Moved by Coun. Galloway, seconded by Coun. Becroft, that \$2100 be levied for the taxes of 1910 for the following purposes: County rate, \$352.01; village rate, \$534.72; school rate, \$715; town hall debentures, \$257.54; cement walks debentures, \$240.73; and that a by-law authorizing the same be now read a first time.

MOVED BY BECROFT, seconded by Galloway, that by-law No. 140 the village rates be read now a second and third time and passed. Motion carried. Moved by Councillors Becroft, seconded by Councillors Galloway, that the council now adjourn to meet again at the call of the reeve.—Carried. J. C. Gilchrist, Clerk. Mr. and Mrs. Archie Campbell announce the engagement of their youngest daughter, Mary Catherine, to Rev. Harry Breerton Wooding, only son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Wooding, of McLaren-st., Ottawa, the marriage to take place early in September. The Eldon Agricultural Society will hold their annual fair at Woodville on Sept. 15 and 16. The directors have spared no pains to make this year's fair the best ever held by the Society. The baseball tournament for a purse of \$80 will be a special feature. Four of the best teams in the county will compete. A number of the Masons from here attended divine service with the brethren of Murray lodge, Beaverton, on Sunday, 28th inst. Council Proceedings of United Townships of Laxton, Digby and Longford

Council met in the township hall, Head Lake, with all members present.

RESOLUTIONS. That the reeve issue his order on the treasurer for the following bills: Dr. Jas. Grant, for attendance re scarlet fever report from Donald \$11.10; phoning to Dr. White (Kinnmount), 40 cents; telegram to Dr. Sody, of Haffburton, and reply collect 65c.; Matthew Greer, jr., for waiting upon the Hoskins people during their trouble with diphtheria, \$2; the Municipal World, for 26 road commissioners' pay sheets, and postage \$1.08; insuring the township hall in the Farmers' Union Mutual Fire Insurance Co., \$4.50.

Kerr and Sullivan—That the reeve be authorized to pay all gravel certificates that he knows the respective road commissioners of the municipality to be entitled to for the year 1910 at the rate laid down by said municipal council.—Carried. Kerr and Sullivan—That the clerk be instructed to write Mr. Boadway, instructing him to remove his fence off Morrison-st, west of the Cameron Road, Norland, and also to notify Richard Day, agent for the Raven Lake Cement Co. to remove their fence off the same street east of the Cameron Road, Norland.—Carried. Davey and Sullivan—That this council refuse to comply with the request of Mr. A. Fielder, asking to have his school taxes transferred from S.S. No. 3, Laxton, to School Section, No. 3, Bexley. Davey and Perkins—That this council instruct the reeve to issue an order on the treasurer in favor of Mr. Nelson Newman for the sum of \$9.45, being payment for plank used on bridge over Head River on the Monk Road.—Carried. Kerr and Sullivan—That this council instruct the reeve to issue an

order on the treasurer in favor of Andrew McDonald for the sum of \$3.80, as payment for repairing the Head River bridge.—Carried. Perkins and Davey—That by-law No. 276, being a by-law to levy and collect the sum of \$1626.16 to meet the current expenses of the year be read a second time in committee of the whole.—Carried. Kerr and Sullivan—That the by-law No. 277, being a by-law to appoint a collector to collect the taxes on all rateable property in the municipality for the year 1910 be read a third time, passed, signed and sealed.—Carried. Perkins and Davey—That by-law No. 278, being a by-law to raise by way of loan the sum of \$1800 for the erection of a school house in School Section No. 3 in the Township of Laxton, Digby and Longford, and to authorize the issue of debentures therefor, be read a third time, passed, signed and sealed.—Carried. Kerr and Davey—That by-law No. 279, being a by-law of the corporation of Laxton, Digby and Longford, granting the Norland Independent Telephone Company permission to erect telephone lines along any highways they desire throughout the municipality be read a third time.—Carried. Perkins and Kerr—That this council instruct the reeve to look after the repairing or rebuilding of the Tallman bridge in Longford.—Carried. Davey and Kerr—That this council instruct the reeve to issue an order on the treasurer in favor of R. H. Southern, clerk, for the sum of \$45.76, half year's salary, stationery, expenses, postage, etc., to date.—Carried. R. H. SOUTHERN, Tp. Clerk.

Some Mariposa Tax Rates Communications were received as follows: From Mr. Alex. Daniels, respecting clearing out the ditch at the north end of his farm; from Mr. A. G. Cavana notifying the council that he had called for tenders for the construction of Municipal Drain No. 1. Mr. George Real requested that a culvert be placed across the road near the railroad track at lot 10, con. 7. The reeve reported that he and Mr. Rogers had examined the drain at lot 21 in con. 8 and found some dirt trapped in at the outlet of the tile, which was ordered to be cleaned out, and that any further cleaning or deepening would require to be taken to the outlet of the drain. Mr. J. M. Swain reported that he had examined Mr. Stanley Howens' wire fence, built by him last year, but could not consent to having the bonus paid till the logs, stones, trees and rubbish had been cleared away. The council then took up the estimates for the year, and upon reaching a conclusion we find that just about the same amount of taxes will be levied for 1910 as for last year, but on account of a slight reduction in the assessment on some of the poorer farms, the burden of taxation will be slightly shifted to the

better farms. The trustees' requisitions are some \$300 less this year than last, also the special levy on the village of Oakwood is \$75 less. **RESOLUTIONS PASSED.** By-law 673 authorized the levy of a rate of 2.1 mills on the village of Oakwood, and of 3 mills on the village of Little Britain for special levies. By-law 674 authorized the levy of \$441.30 for school section rates, on the various sections of the township. By-law 675 authorized the levy of \$770.99 for a county rate, made up as follows: General purpose rate, \$552.14; House of Refuge Debenture Rate, \$639.05; School rate, \$375.85, with a rate of 2.3 mills on the dollar. Also a levy of \$6418 for a general school rate with a rate of 1.9 mills on the dollar, also the sum of \$8300 for a township rate, with a levy of 2.4 mills on the dollar. On motion of Messrs. Varcoe and Ferguson, the time is extended for the engineer to file his report respecting the cause of the drainage trouble at lot 14 in concession 12, Mariposa, as provided by By-law 659.—J. R. Weldon, (Clerk).

When Earl Grey on the occasion of his recent visit to England advised British manufacturers to exhibit at the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto he did a thing which a few short years ago would have gotten him into trouble. The sectional spirit was within the memory of the youngest citizen so strong in Canada that to "boost" the Toronto Fair would have been regarded as an exhibition of favoritism. Efficient management has made such a change in matters that to-day the Canadian National Exhibition is recognized as an institution in which all Canada takes pride. The best proof of it is that every province from ocean to ocean will send official exhibits illustrative of its resources, to this year's event. The aim of the directors has always been to make it a magnificent demonstration of the resources of this country and the Exhibition of 1910 will be an education to the Canadian and the foreign visitors alike in the possibilities of this Canada of ours.
