Tax Rates in Eldon

Council met in Plank's hall. Mat
Nealon waited on the council re the
signing of the agreement for the con-
struction of municipal drain No. 1.
The agreement was duly signed by
Reeve Steele, Mat Nealon and Jno.
Robinson. Mr. Nealon asked the
council to accept private bonds for
\$2000 on the drain construction. The
council agreed to do so.

James McGirr addressed the coun-
cil asking municipal aid for Wil-
liam Packhart of the village of Bois-
over, who is sick and unable to
work. The council did not think
that they were justified in granting
charity to any person who is eligible
for the House of Refuge, and they in-
structed Reeve Steele to have Wm.
Packhart examined by a doctor to
see if he was eligible for admittance
to the House of Refuge.

COMMUNICATIONS.
Sawyer & Massey, stating that
they would submit the defective jaw
for the stone crusher to the manufac-
turers of same, and would give the
township credit for same if the man-
ufacturers would allow it to them;
also enclosing a credit note for \$200
overcharged on stone crusher jaws.

John McEachern, notifying the
council that the culvert on the 1st
quarter line opposite lot 5, Conces-
sion 7 needs repairing.

J. Hurren enclosing \$25.47 amounts
charged against him on the A. D.
Campbell and W. R. Foster drains.

County Treasurer, acknowledging
receipt of copy of Assessor's return
relative to lands liable to be sold
for arrears of taxes.

A. G. Cavana, O.L.S. apportioning
the \$10 extra cost of removing
rock from railroad on A. D. Camp-
bell drain; also his certificate that
the rock contract of Jno. McFarlane
on the A. D. Campbell drain had
been completed satisfactory and his
account re passing same of \$44.80.

W. R. Foster, enclosing cheque for
\$69, his portion of engineer's costs
on W. R. Foster drain, also asking
to have the engineer notified to let
by contract his portion of the W. R.
Foster drain as soon as the time for
appeal had expired.

E. Mosgrove, manager of the Ster-
ling Bank, showing a balance of \$1-
428.12 on deposit to the credit of
the township on June 30th, 1910,
and also showing loans to date of
\$6000.

C. H. Sproule, assistant provincial
treasurer, stating that the provincial
treasurer had recommended the
purchase of the proposed issue of drain-
age debentures approved of under by-
law No. 352 of the township of Eldon
and asking to have an applica-
tion for the amount presently re-
quired together with debentures and
form 7 and 8 forwarded to him at
once.

C. N. McDonald enclosing account
for \$2 for two days work finishing
grading on road division 79.

Mr. Alex. McInnes was paid \$3 for
work done on Foster drain.

By-law No. 355 of the municipali-
ty of Eldon, a by-law authorizing the
levying and collecting of general rates
to the amount of \$1,505.62 for
the year 1910 as follows: County,
2.4 mills on the dollar; general
township, 3.6 mills; general school,
2.5 mills.

Trustees school rates on the rate-
able property of the different school
sections for the year 1910 follows:
Union S.S. No. 1, rate of 4.3 mills;
S.S. 1, rate of 2.6 mills; Union S.
S. 2, rate of 1.7 mills; S.S. 2, rate
of 1.0 mills; S.S. 3, rate of 1.3
mills; S.S. 4, rate of .8 mills; S.S.
5, rate of 2.9 mills; S.S. 6, rate of
1.6 mills; S.S. 7, rate of 1.4 mills;
S.S. 8, rate of 2.6 mills; Union S.
S. 9, rate of 3.2 mills; Union S.S.
10, rate of 2.3 mills.

W. F. McEachern—A. D. McEach-
ern: That by-law No. 357 to autho-
rize the municipal council of the
township of Eldon to raise the sum
of \$1,500.00 for the purchase of a
school site and the erection of a new
public school house for S.S. No. 8
was read the usual number of times,
passed, signed and sealed.

McFadyen—Spence—That we give
the Eldon Agricultural Society a

grant of \$35 for the year 1910.—
Carried.

Spence—A. D. McEachern: That
the clerk be instructed to notify Mr.
Dan Campbell of Kirkfield to remove
his fence on the road allowance op-
posite lot 7, con. 9, as it is impos-
sible to grade the road until the
fence is removed.—Carried.

W. F. McEachern—A. D. McEachern
—That the applications of Thomas
Russell for \$500, Far. McEachern for
\$1000, and Jno. Ward for \$500 for
tile drainage under by-law No. 352
of the township of Eldon be accept-
ed, and that the clerk be instructed
to consult with the township soli-
citor re same, and that the clerk and
the reeve be authorized to make full
arrangements re granting said loans.
—Carried

W. F. McEachern—A. D. McEachern
—That B. Stacey be appointed drain-
age inspector under 9 Edward VII
Chap. 22, and by-law No. 352 of the
township of Eldon, that he receive
\$3 per day for his services, and that
the corporate seal be attached to
this motion to give it the force of a
by-law.—Carried.

McFadyen—Spence—That the clerk
be instructed to prepare a by-law
setting the collector's salary at \$80
per year.—Carried.

A. D. McEachern—Spence: That
the following accounts be passed:

\$56.70; Jno. Thornbury, work on
stone crusher, \$89.75; Mal. McEach-
ern, work on stone crusher, \$42; H.

Moore, money paid Jno. McLachlan
for repairs, \$1.72; Hugh Moore work
on stone crusher, \$26.20; John
Thornbury, work on stone crusher,
\$38.40; Mal. McEachern, work on
stone crusher, \$81.90; Mrs. T. Mor-
rison, charity, \$6; Mal. McLean, re-
pairs for grader, \$9.45; Mal. Mc-
Lean, culvert on A. D. Campbell
drain, \$51.36; F. Stewart, building
dam as per injunction, \$26.20; Wm.
A. Robinson, minute book, \$1.50.—
Carried.

Meeting at Manilla**

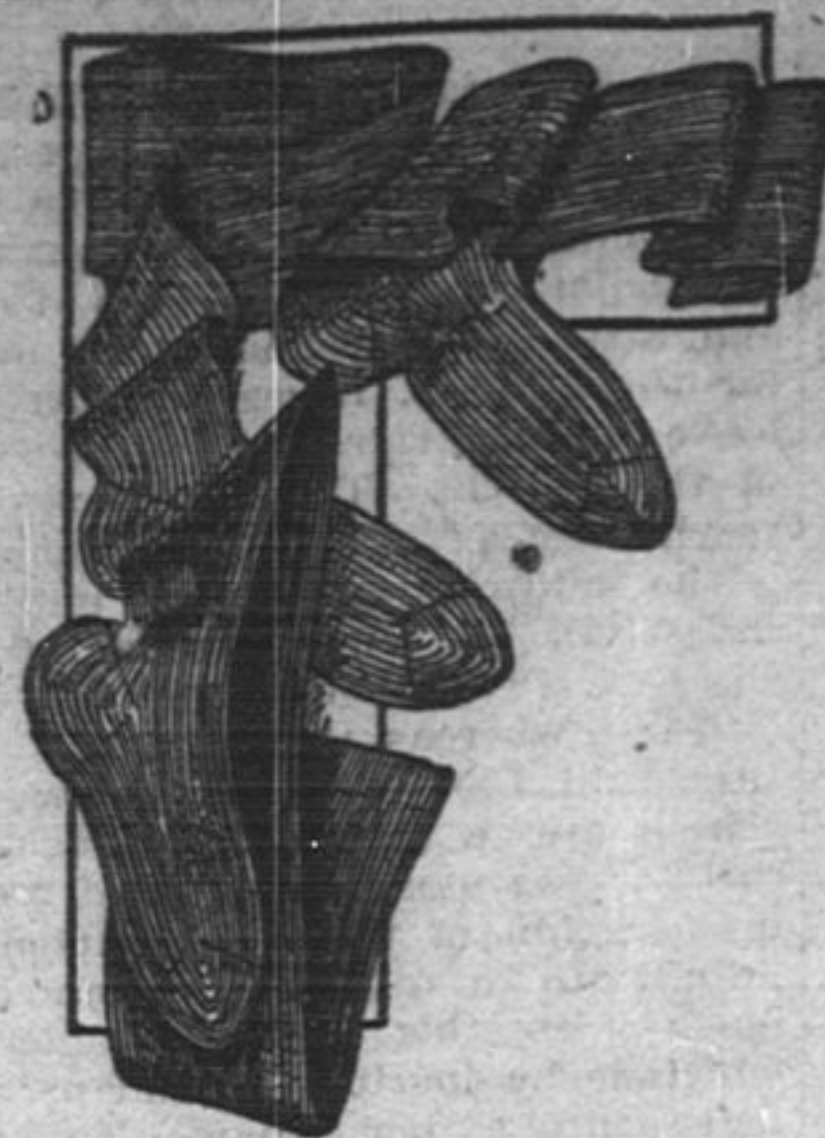
Manilla, Aug. 29.—The women's in-

TWO MEN KILLED.
In a collision in the Grand Trunk
Railway yards at Belleville Satur-
day morning two men were instan-
tly killed and a third man suffered
from shock. Peter Young, engineer
on a work train, and Edward Brew-
er, a car tapper, were the victims.
The accident occurred at 6 o'clock.

Young's engine was at the foot of
the main line. It was partially on
the south track, near the east end
of the platform, and the semaphore
was set against the westbound train.

east, running at high speed, dashed
into the engine, and Young, who
jumped when he saw the collision in-
evitable, was caught between his en-
gine and tender and killed.

His fireman, Fred Gariehy of King-
ston, remained on the engine, and
escaped with a slight shock. Ed-
ward Brewer, a car tapper, who was
on the platform, was thrown on the
track by the shock of the collision,
and the wheels of one engine passed
over him, causing instant death. Mr.
Weir, of Brockville, engineer of the
special, said he did not see the sem-
aphore owing to the steam from

Young's engine. Both victims lived
at Belleville.

Engineer Young has a host of friends
in Lindsay who will regret to
hear of his fatal accident. He was a
brother of Mrs. William Wickett, of
Lindsay, and was well known and
highly respected by the railway men.
He was a general favorite with his
fellow-employees. He was born in
Belleville about 35 years ago, and
had lived there all his life. For
some years he had been an employee
of the railway, and was a capable
and painstaking engineer. He was a
member of the G.T.R. ball team. In
religion the deceased was a Roman
Catholic. A wife and one young son
survives. His untimely death is a
severe shock to his fellow comrades.
