Then when the very cream of such is extracted and put upon the show table or in the stall, or in the coop, or whether it be here or there, as we gather round to view the display our very hearts shall warm with pride upon such a goodly heritage.

**GETTING ALONG**

There are different ways of "getting along," as prosperity is sometimes called. It does not always mean simply making money, or becoming a great man for other people to look up to with wonder and admiration. Leaving off a bad habit for a good one is getting along; to be careful and saving, instead of thoughtless and extravagant, is getting along; to be active and industrious, instead of idle and lazy, is getting along; to work as diligently and faithfully in one's employer's absence as in his presence, is getting along. In short, when we see any one attentive to his duties, persevering through difficulties to acquire such a knowledge as will be of use to himself and others, offering a good example to those around him, that man can be truly said to be getting along in the world.

Many people fall behind, or miss the way altogether, because they do not perceive the simple and abundant means of getting along which surrounds them on every side; and it very often happens that these means are aids to getting along which can be had for the taking, but which no amount of money could purchase.

**THE MODERN WAY**

This is the age of publicity. The Boston Herald notes that even universities are coming down from their pedestals and undertaking advertising campaigns. The University of Michigan has set frankly and systematically to work to spread the gospel of its own virtues abroad, and makes no apology for the same. Not content with the ordinary distribution of formal "catalogues," a half dozen members of the faculty were recently sent on a tour of the Central, Western and Pacific States. Lectures were delivered on education and illustrated with colored slides of the life in Ann Arbor. Placards showing vital statistics were presented, and the delegation devoted alumni wherever any number of itself to a fraternization with the alumni wherever any number of them could be corralled. The result was the long needed organization of the thousands of graduates, whose support and interest, as in the case of Harvard, will be invaluable. All the prize-winning grain which was shown at the Toronto Exhibition in the competition held by the Provincial Government, has been distributed throughout the province to the fourteen agricultural specialists, who will distribute it among the farmers of the district, for seed.  
Mr. D. A. MacKenzie, B.S.A., of the Lindsay branch of the Department of Agriculture, has received two bushels of prize-winning oats, and this he will distribute among some of the farmers in Victoria County, with the understanding that they will in turn bring back an equal amount when next year's crop is harvested. They will in turn be given next year to other farmers by the specialists. Thus the prize grain the best in the province, will be distributed throughout the entire province, and the grain of the province improved.

A former citizen of Lindsay, Mr. W. H. Merrell, who now resides near Bobcaygeon, writes the following letter to the editor of the Bobcaygeon Independent:

Sir,—Kindly allow me space in your valuable paper to briefly express my views on the form of amusement known as parlor dancing, from my point of view. It is wrong from the fact that it is questionable on the ground that it is a stepping stone to something of a different character, that of the public ball room. Now, as I look on it as wrong from my point of view, I don't for a moment say that a person can not be a Christian and dance. Now, these few lines are written at request, and feeling myself responsible by the position I hold in a movement which has for one object the winning of the world by Bible study and practical work, I felt it my duty to comply with the request.
