The sixty-second annual fall fair under the auspices of the Mariposa Agricultural Society was held in the pretty village of Oakwood Tuesday afternoon, and considering the inclement weather, the fair was a decided success. The weather man was all to the bad, and sent torrents of rain to the earth all morning and up to one o'clock it looked as if the fair would have to be called off, but such was not the case, for at two o'clock the heavy dark clouds rolled away, and the sun shone brightly during the remainder of the day.

**GOOD CROWD.**  
One would imagine that the fair would have a small attendance, owing to the wet weather, but such was not the case, for at three o'clock almost one thousand people were on the grounds, and they were present to a real fall-fair in every department. **PROSPEROUS FAIR.**  
Mariposa township is known as the summer township of the county, and it really deserves the name, as an air of prosperity can be observed in all sections. The farmers are prosperous, and their land, buildings, etc., are unequalled in any part of Canada. As to the sixty-second fair held yesterday, it was a grand success as far as the showing of exhibits were concerned. The display in all lines was up to the standard. The grounds quickly dried up after the heavy morning rains, and everything was run off without a hitch.

**GRAND DISPLAY OF HORSES.**  
A grand display of horses in all classes was shown, and it was easily one of the best horse shows ever shown at a fair in the country. The horses were of the best variety and especially the driving horses took the attention of the large crowd for some time. The competitor was very keen, and the judges had their work cut out in declaring the winners.

The farmers' race as usual attracted the attention of the crowd and they thoroughly enjoyed the annual event for the best trotter or pacer in the township. There were three entries, Jas. Thornydyke's "Miss Jay", W. Rich's "Brown Mack", and J. Degeer's "Honest Tom". Miss Jay was too fast for her opponents, and won with ease in three straight heats. The little pacer has had the honor of winning this event for the past three years. Brown Mack and Honest Tom divided second money, each having two seconds to their credit. The track was in first class condition, but for some unknown reason the time was not given out. The prize was \$10, which was donated by Mr. G. Dean, manager of the Bank of Montreal.

**OPEN RACE.**  
The open race for a prize of \$50 attracted considerable attention. Furioso, owned by Parks, of Sutton, after losing the first heat to Harry K., went out and won the race in the next three heats.
