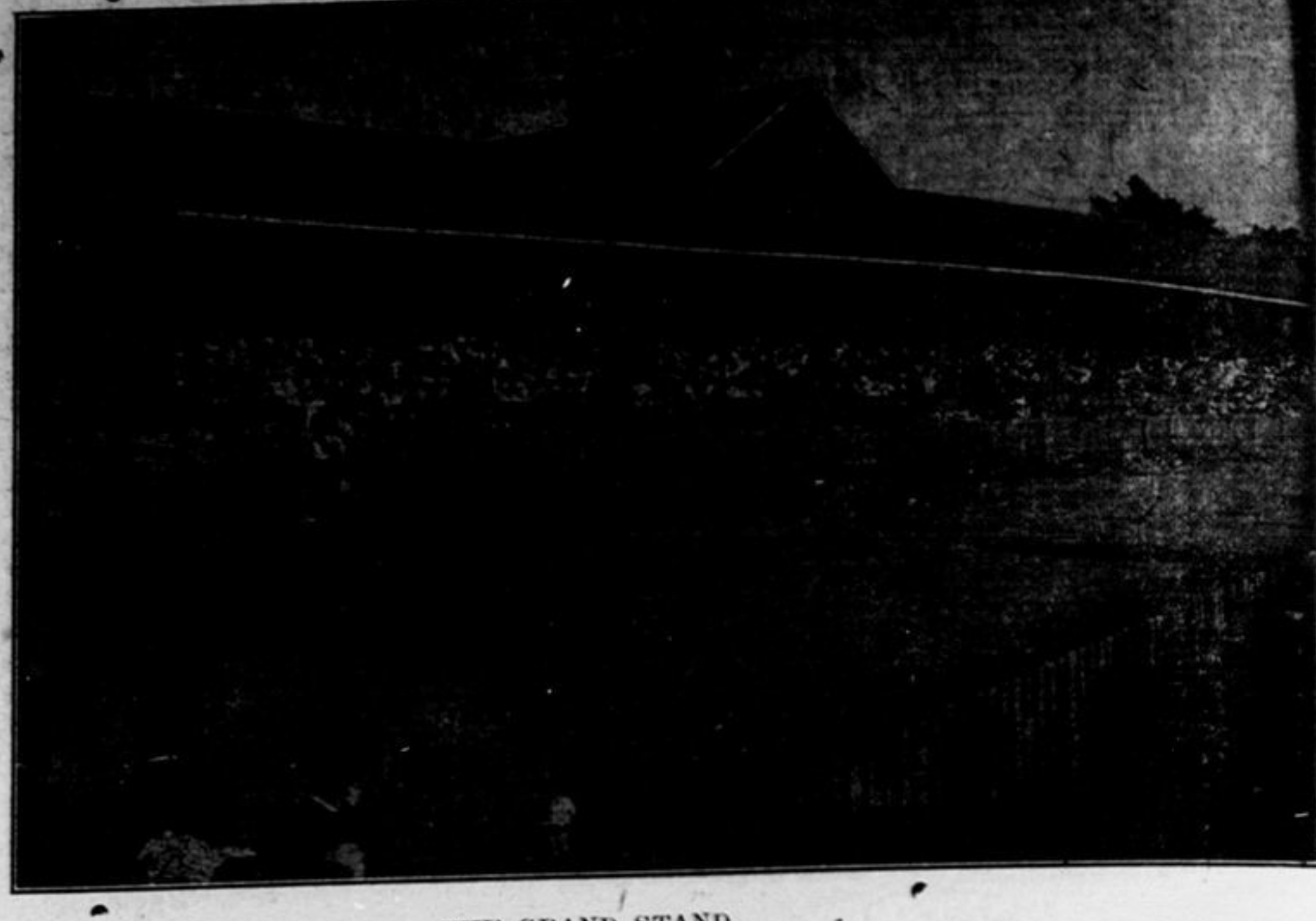

#### Through Ontario With The British-Born

##### SALUT STE. MARIE.

Once more the Scotch accent; this time in a large man with the big broad head that gets things done—three parts full of spirit and a Liberal of many years; about to cast his first vote against a Liberal candidate, and a glad Secretary of the Canada-British Association.

This was one of the men who happened to be at the station when I arrived. He was the only Scot. The rest were English.

Well, there was a bull-dog and a lumber-jack on the floor, alongside the speaker's table; and the bull-dog kept silence as long as he could; but when the audience loudly resented the interruptions of a too spirituously interrupted person, the dog joined the racket, and was led to a less exciting quarters.

They tell you that at the 800 things are very different from what they are "in the East." They like to think they are Western. There is flavour of the bush and mines, as well as of the unalloyed about the place; and the quality of speech here and there that is breezy, after its own fashion. We met a prominent citizen, who was asked if he was going to the meeting—a grandson of Scotland, who has been in Scotland and liked it.

A branch of the Canada-British Association having been formed, the Secretary of the Sons of England became its secretary.

#### Manvers Pond Yields Many Fish

Toronto Star: Down at Manvers, a small station not far from Peterboro, is a lake about fifty acres in area, which is used as a fishing preserve for the members of the Manvers Fishing and Shooting Club, to which many prominent Toronto men belong.

A new cement dam is being constructed by a Toronto firm at one end of the lake, and to do so the water had to be lowered considerably.

When the workmen had let it all out but about three feet they noticed the surface of the water was becoming agitated in a wonderful manner. A little more was let off, and then they noticed the reason.

The whole bottom of the lake for a depth of over a foot was literally covered with fish.

Thus there were many nice-sized trout in evidence, but the greatest number were mudcats of enormous dimensions. Immediately all work on the dam was at an end, as the workmen, armed with axes and clubs, started in on a wholesale slaughter.

#### Leaped From Train When Awakened

Brantford, Ont., Sept. 10. — John Conowski, a foreigner, hailing from Scranton, Pa., jumped through the window of a fast train, pulling into Brantford, early Saturday morning, under strange circumstances.

He was asleep and the conductor went to awake him up, touching Conowski on the shoulder. The latter gave a start and jumped through the closed window, clearing the tracks when he fell. He was recovered and taken to the hospital, his head being badly injured.

The victim is unable to speak a word of English and it is thought he was under the influence of a nightmare when he was awakened. He will recover.

#### RAFT TORN FROM TOWING TUGS

Sarnia, Sept. 9.—The tugs Reid, of Sarnia, and Fisher, of Port Huron, towing a raft of 6,000,000 feet of logs from Georgian Bay, encountered heavy weather when approaching near last night, and the raft was torn from them and scattered along the harbor beach for several miles.

#### INSANE MAN ELUDED GUARD.

Guelph, Ont., Sept. 10.—Harry Ingraham, a young man about thirty years of age, whose home is in North Sydney, Cape Breton, but who had been an inmate of the Homeewood Sanitarium in this city for the past ten days, committed suicide last night by hanging himself to the limb of a big hemlock tree on the farm of Cecil Harrison, in Puslinch township.

He escaped from his guard at the Homeewood shortly after 7 o'clock Saturday morning, and an all-day search was made for him in the woods surrounding the city and in the river, but without success, and messages were sent to all the nearby towns to be on the lookout for him.

Sunday morning shortly after seven o'clock Mrs. Harrison, the young wife of the farmer, went out to bring in the cows for the morning milking, and was chasing them out of the bush when she saw the body dangling at the end of a rope. She immediately ran as fast as possible to the house and informed her husband of what she had seen.
