People in North Hear Candidate

Col. Hughes, the Conservative candidate and other speakers associated with him held three enthusiastic and rousing meetings Wednesday. The Colonel was accorded a most earnest and appreciative hearing by the excellent audience last night at Kilmount. In the morning Col. Hughes spoke at Lamb's in Verulam, and in the afternoon addressed an enthusiastic meeting at Burnt River. At the Kilmount meeting Col. Hughes was assisted by Geo. McCarty, of Bethany and Dr. Sims, of Fenelon Falls, while Mr. Jas. R. Mark, of Kilmount acted as chairman. Among the prominent men on the platform were John Lyle (chairman of Lutterworth); Amos Train, of Kilmount; and the old veteran, Jas. Wilson.

Col. Hughes dealt with the various phases of the issue before the people with his old time convincing thoroughness. He asked why the Laurier Government had not gone about the question of reciprocity in an intelligent way, by submitting it to the people independently of an election. If they had been willing to trust the people they would have been willing to submit a referendum. Had they done so, reciprocity would have been snuffed under 3 to 1. They had brought on reciprocity on themselves to cover up a multitude of Government sins. The speaker ably dwelt upon the undeveloped condition of Canada when reciprocity was sought with the United States. Then came the Knox-Fielding pact brought about in secrecy, the announcement being made simultaneously at Ottawa and Washington. As to whether this pact was for the benefit of Canada, we had only to reflect that the United States is not anxious to benefit us—she is not built that way. Ontario, in the next fifty years he said would be the Birmingham of Canada. We in Ontario, had been hearing the expense of the legislation. The speaker pointed to such articles as hogs, hams, bacon, lard, shipped to Canada, paying the duty, to the value of three million dollars yearly. What would they ship in if the duty were removed he asked. They export \$20 worth of

products to the British market to one of Canada's he said, and he asked what becomes of the "larger market" argument. He demonstrated clearly that it would be a ruinous loss to the Canadian farmer if the duty were taken of American horses. The speaker also showed conclusively by the record of exports and imports of eggs, and a comparison of prices that under reciprocity the Canadian farmer would not get rich by the sale of eggs. The market for garden produce would be destroyed, owing to the earlier development of American vegetables. "Are you farmers in a better or worse condition than the farmers to the south of you," he asked. "Are your farms increasing in value or are they not," were questions they would have to work out for themselves.

MILLINERY OPENING

MAGNIFICENT DISPLAY AT MISS MITCHELL'S.

Reminiscences Gleaned From Files of Warder

Mount Horeb, Dec. 2, 1892.—As Mr. W. J. Skuce was threshing at Mr. Jas. Moore's, in some way he got his right arm broken in two places, but under the careful treatment of Dr. Degross we hope to see him again before long.

On Tuesday evening a fatal accident occurred on the farm of Mr. Frank Chambers, Fenelon, on the boundary between Mariposa and Fenelon west of the village of Cambridge, whereby Joseph Wells, a young man of twenty-three, lost his life. Mr. Wells, who owned and ran a steam threshing machine, had been threshing for Mr. Chambers and having got through climbed on top of the engine to lower the smoke stack, when he slipped, falling between the fly wheel and the boiler. Death was instantaneous, his head being crushed in as well as the body more or less crushed. The deceased was a son of Mr. Robert Wells of Mariposa, and was universally respected.

RAIDED THE BOWERY.
Chief Constable Bell, assisted by Constable Foster, made another raid on the Bowery last night, arresting two of the inmates. On Monday they were arraigned before the chief magistrate and sentenced to one year and eleven months in the Mercer.

DESTROYED BY FIRE.
Early on Monday morning a house occupied by William Balance, in the east ward, owned by a Mr. Currin of Toronto, was destroyed by fire. Mr. Balance lost all his effects that were upstairs, all down stairs being saved. The firemen were early on the scene and did good work in preventing the fire spreading to adjoining buildings.

CAUSE OF UNREST.
Tekin, Sept. 7.—Missionaries in the outlying districts of Sze-Chuen Province have been ordered by the Viceroy to concentrate in the larger towns in consequence of the general unrest among the natives, arising from the Government's railroad policy. All foreigners in Chengtu, the capital of Sze-Chuen province, are taking refuge in the compound of the Missionary Society, of the Methodist Church of Canada.

CAUSE OF DISORDERS.
Sze Chuen is a western province at China, bordering on Tibet, and Chengtu is some 2,000 miles from the coast. It has an area of upwards of 200,000 square miles. The population is estimated at about 70,000,000, far exceeding that of any other Chinese province.

The people have risen in protest against the railroad project of the Chinese Government, the agitation being directed chiefly against the construction of the Sze-Chuen-Hankow railroad. This railroad is to be built with foreign capital, a loan of \$90,000,000 for this purpose having been made to China by British, French, German and American Bankers.

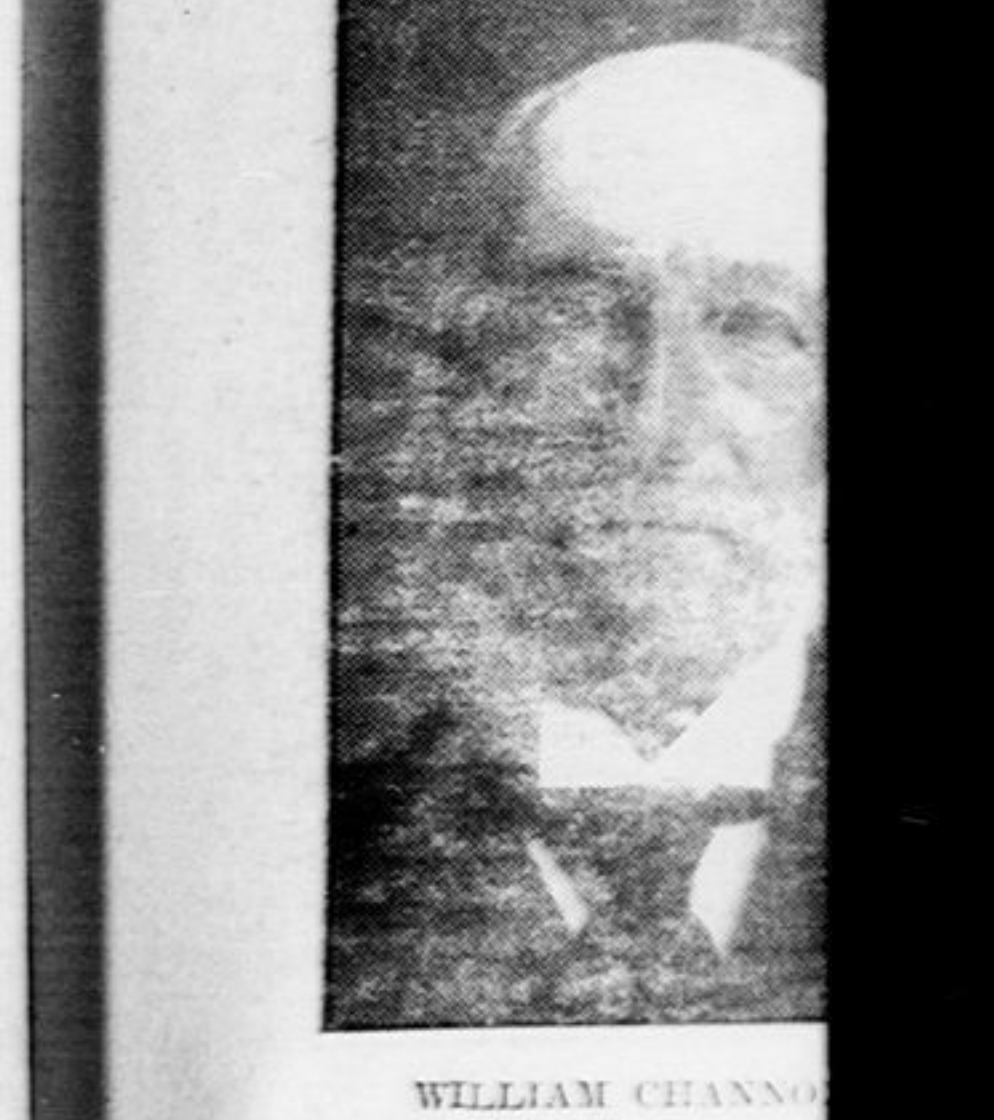
TURNED IT DOWN.
