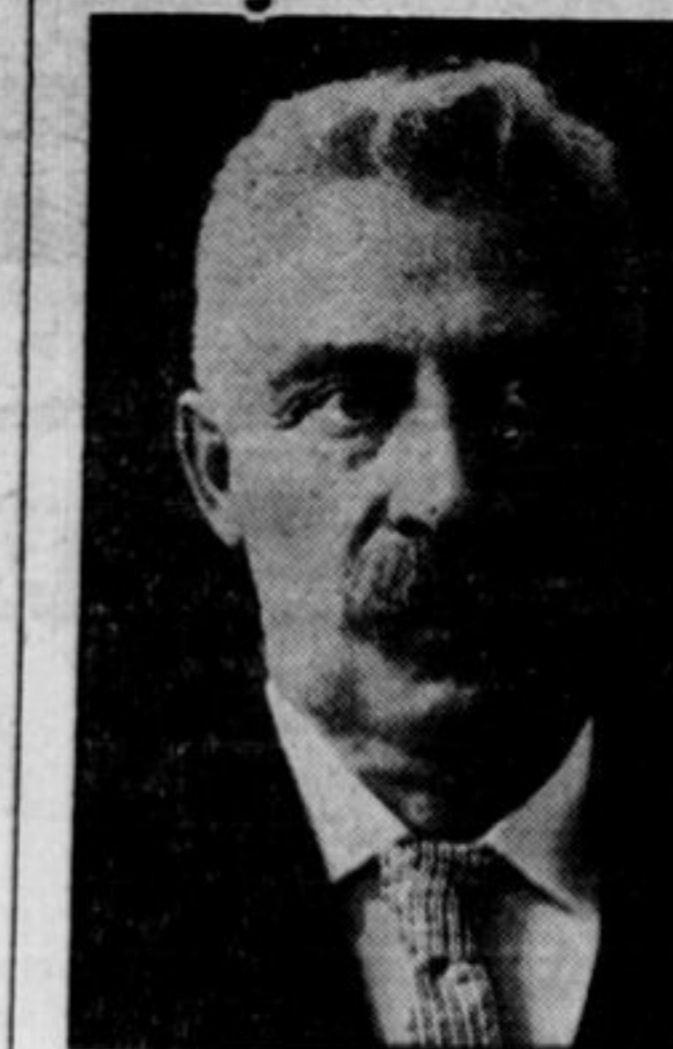

Miss Vida Sheeha has returned home from Fenelon Falls.

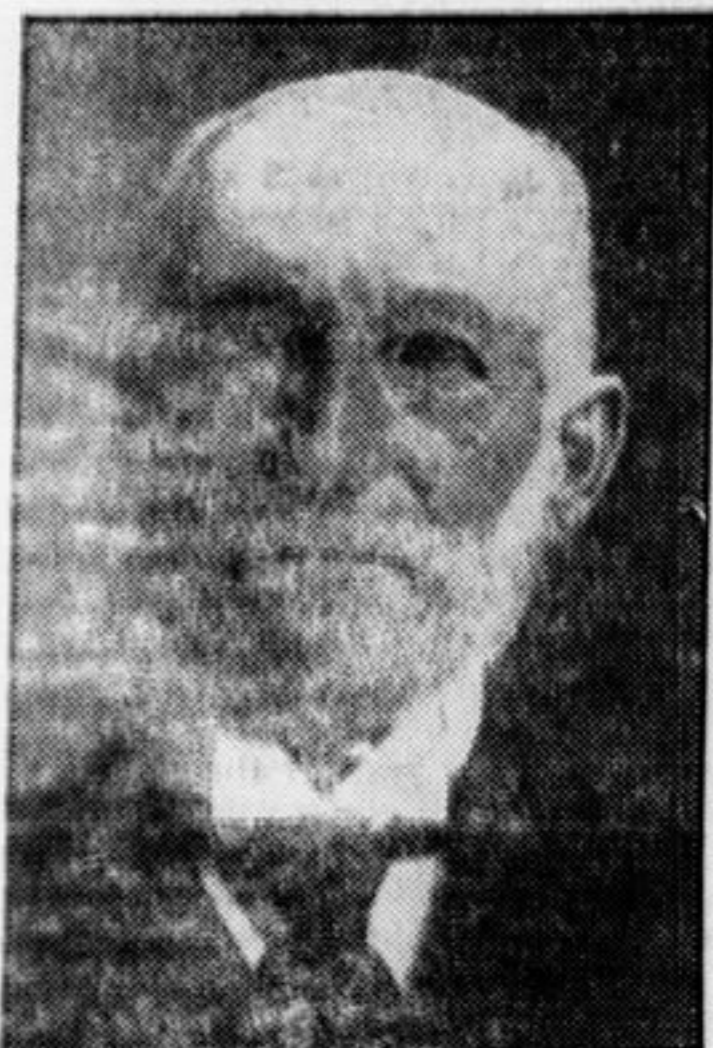

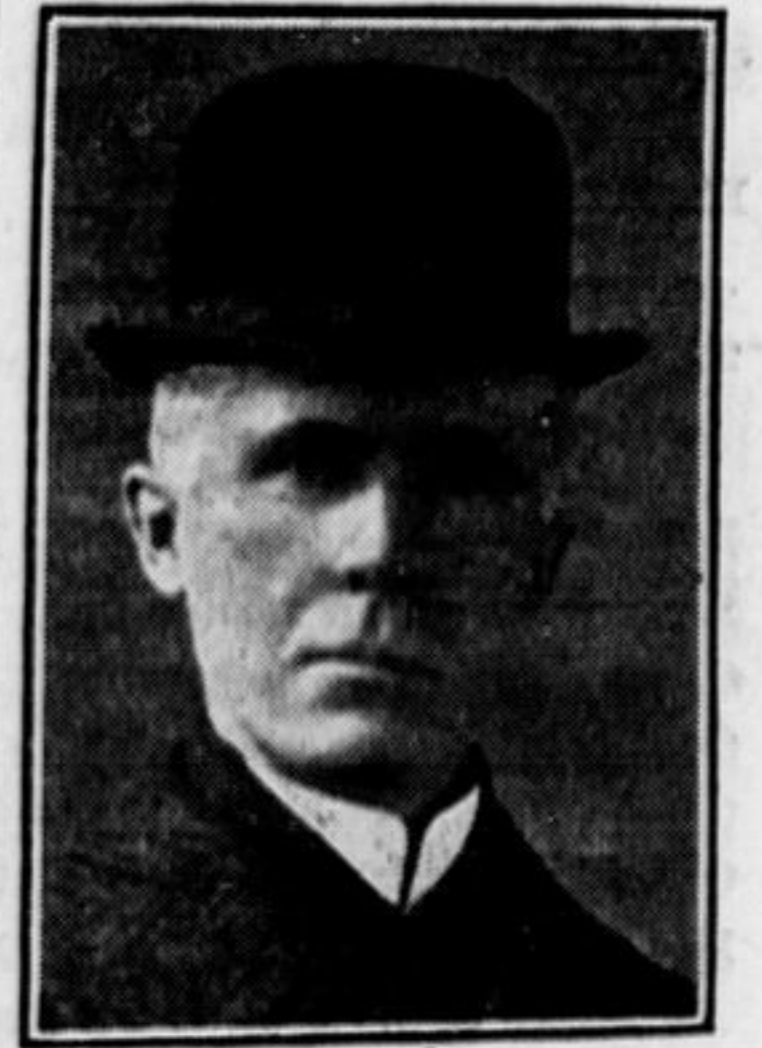
Miss Thornton, who has been the guest of friends out of town for a great part of the summer, has returned home.
