

Strict Law For Elections

There are very few persons acquainted with the contents of the statute under which the present general election is being held. This election must be conducted according to law.

It will be a surprise to most people to know that Section 284 declares it to be unlawful to furnish or supply any ensign, standard or flag with the intention that it shall be carried or used in the electoral district on the day of the election or within eight days before such day, or during the continuance of such election. The section goes on to make clear that no person shall use as a party emblem the flag of the country.

It is also against the law to furnish or supply any ribbon, label, or device as a party badge to distinguish the wearer as the supporter of any candidate or of the political or other opinions entertained, or supposed to be entertained, by such candidate.

Those who may not vote, or, in other words, are disqualified from voting, are clearly set forth. For instance no judge can cast a vote. No returning officer or election clerk can vote, but a deputy returning officer can. The vote of the returning officer is limited to a case of an equality of votes between the candidates.

BOWMANVILLE FAIR.

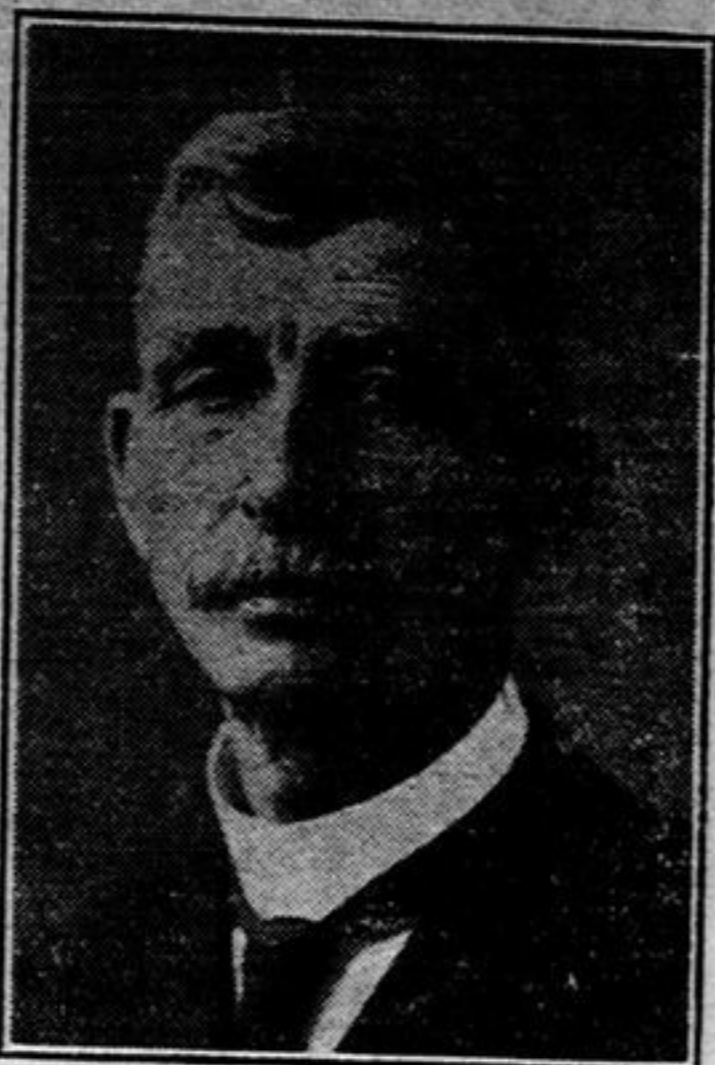

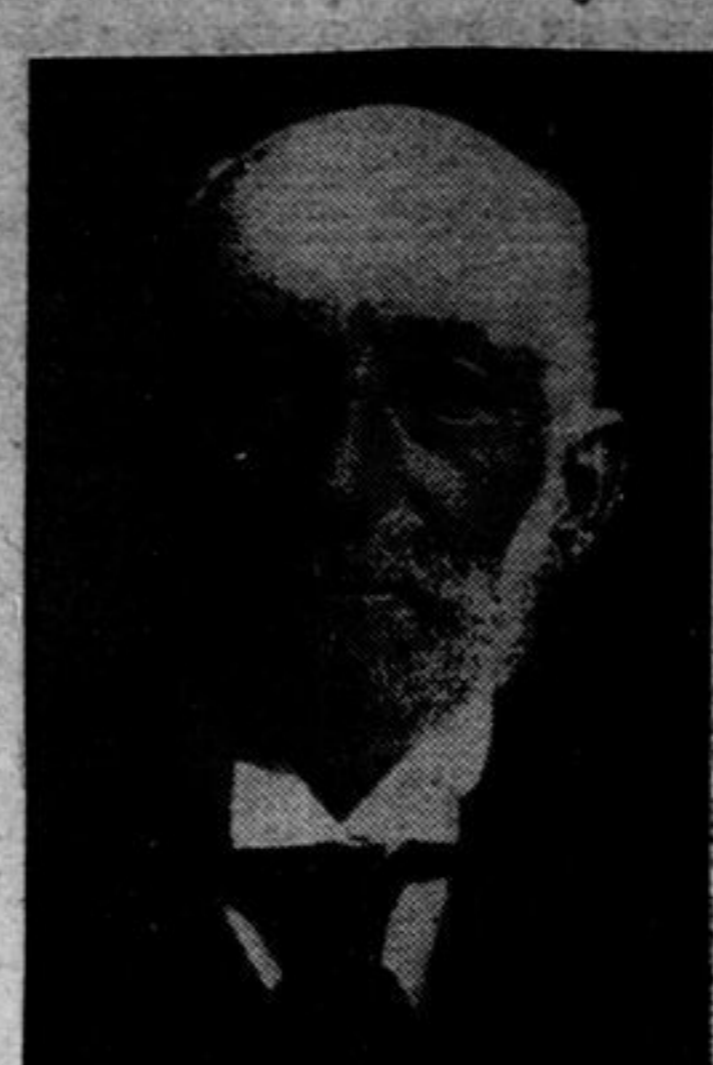

Thousands of Women Would Wed

New York, Sept. 11.—The world's record for proposals of marriage—received, not given—probably will be conceded to Col. Edward H. R. Green, son of Hetty Green, the world's richest woman, for it was learned to-day that within the last few months he has received 6,242 such offers.

Not long ago, Col. Green, who is 40 years old and a jovial bachelor, remarked good-naturedly to a reporter: "When I find the right girl I will marry her, if she will have me." Now he wishes he had kept still, for women who would like to share his name and his wealth are writing to him at the rate of about one hundred letters a day.

The contest for his hand has developed into an international event. Of the proposals received to date 1,331 were from foreign shores and 720 of these were penned by the ladies of the United Kingdom. The letters reach him through his house and offices here and via his residence in Texas.

THE HOME MARKET

The Loss of Reciprocity in 1886 Resulted in the Creation of Profitable Industries for Canada

It is true that both political parties in Canada formerly desired a measure of Reciprocity with the United States. But that was when trade generally was small and depressed, and before proof had been given that, on the line of antagonism to Canadian prosperity, laid down by the United States, Canada could flourish as an exporter of farm and forest products and be essentially independent of the United States.

There was a Reciprocity Treaty between the two countries from 1854 to 1866, which advanced the price of Canadian farm produce. But the Crimean War in the first half and the United States Civil War in the second half of the Reciprocity period raised prices everywhere. The Canadian farmer came to depend upon the United States for his market.

He received a severe lesson when Reciprocity was withdrawn. But, instead of being ruined, he found a more stable market in Great Britain, which has persisted to this day. Instead of sending his crops across the border to the farmer's home market, the gold he received for his produce, instead of going out of the country to purchase goods, was kept in Canada for those who had begun to make things that formerly had been imported, and who bought things of him that otherwise would have gone abroad. This meant better prices for the producer, as it also meant greater earning and spending power in the manufacturing towns.

This change was slow, as men count time; but swift in the reckoning of nations. It was accompanied by a conspicuous disadvantage—young Canadians left Canada by the thousands for the United States, where Canada was regarded as a poor relation.

Will Remodel The Prayer Book

London, Ont., Sept. 11.—The General Synod of the Anglican Church this afternoon passed the recommendation of the committee on the adaptation of the Book of Common Prayer. By so doing the first step was taken in remodeling the Prayer Book to meet the needs of the Canadian Church and the requirements of Canadian associations, something that one wing of the church has been agitating for in many synods for years. The recommendation was not passed without a bitter opposition, however.

The evening session was devoted to the business end of the new Prayer Book, and finally it was adopted, that the Cambridge Press would have copies of the new amended Prayer Book ready for the next General Synod.
