Mixed Farming Increasing in West

Winnipeg, Aug. 29.—According to reports compiled by the Calgary Credit Men's Association, covering all the southern portion of the province and as far north as Stettin, the grain yield will be about 30 per cent. in excess of last year, and will be practically all marketable. Tremendous increases in mixed farming output are reported. For instance, Lethbridge district which last year shipped 50,000 hogs will this year market 450,000. It is expected that the hog output of the Province will be considerably in excess of one million head, as compared with 200,000 last year.

After a tour of a number of West-coast cities Sir William Whyte, director of the Canadian Pacific Railway, presses the opinion that the West will harvest a good crop this year, and that there is little prospect of a money or active business for the time.

The crop is late in the northern part of Alberta and Saskatchewan, but in the southern parts at least two weeks ahead of the time it was at this time last year before. Around Calgary Macleod, at least one-third of the wheat is cut; in fact, from the Jaw west a good portion of the grain has fallen before the bin.

If this weather continues for a week or two, from 40 to 60 per cent. of the wheat will be cut. On the whole it will be a fair average crop. Light in places, it is compensated as usual by heavier yields elsewhere.

END OF SPECULATION.
Banking of business conditions Sir William remarked that trade was "I observed a lot of vacant accommodation in some of the hotels." "Places like Lethbridge and Moose Jaw with a heavy hotel pay-roll, are in better shape than places without similar hotels. I believe that we cannot afford to rush money for some time. This is not a bad thing, though. It will give us a chance to clean up what we have been going ahead too fast of. Of the essential stability of the country there cannot be the slightest doubt."

Speaking on the general condition of the country and the financial situation he stated that there are indications that there will be a general upturn in the money market. All the West the speculation in real estate is practically at an end, however. "That," said Sir William, "is a mixed blessing. There is speculation in value, but no one is anxious to sell, and there is no movement. It will allow us to stock ourselves."

Clever Arrest of Youthful Burglar

A youthful tow-headed prisoner of 19 summers, answering to the name of Benjamin J. Madison, appeared in police court this morning on a serious charge. He had arrived in town about four weeks ago after a six month's graduating course at the prison farm. The array of jewelry, knives, razors, shoes, handkerchiefs, cuff buttons, watches and pocket books which were displayed on a table told the tale of Madison's exploits since coming home.

The prisoner it appears broke into the living apartments of some Italian laborers while they were at work and stole therefrom the above sundry articles.

The police force of the town did quick work on being notified of the burglary, having their man in the toils inside of twelve hours. Chief Chilton placed Acting Chief Parks on the trail who immediately started to investigate. The first clue was the discovery of an iron rod which had a wooden handle about six inches long. With this crude instrument the burglar broke open the trunks which he rifled and took therefrom anything in the shape of valuables. Through the finding of this instrument the constables started their clue and after a little deliberation on the part of Chief Chilton and his assistants the prisoner was considered the guilty party.

About midnight Acting Chief Parks and three constables from the fire hall marched to the home of Madison, and while Constable Parks demanded entrance to the house the balance of the men stood outside with guns in hand ready to meet the burglar should he endeavor to make his escape through the window.

On entering he found Madison in bed and who surrendered to the officer without any trouble.

At this morning's court the prisoner was remanded until next Friday. A pal of Madison's of tender years was also in court and was remanded to the same date.

Both men were handcuffed together and taken to jail by Constable Parks to await their trial.

Treat Criminals as Sick Men, Not Imprison Them as Bad Men, Say Lawyers

Montreal, Sept. 3.—Scientific study of crime, with rational procedure in criminal trials was the subject for discussion before the American Institute of Criminal Law and Criminology here to-day, in connection with the meeting of the American Bar Association.

Among the points brought out by the speakers were the absurdities attending legal processes and language, the fact that a great deal of crime should be nipped in the bud and could be prevented by an efficient police force backed up by heal-

thy public opinion; the necessity of treating prisoners from the corrective rather than the punitive standpoint also found expression.

Alluding to the treatment of law breakers, Mr. Justice Carter, of the Supreme Court of Illinois, said: "Quite as important as changes in the trial are changes in the care and treatment of prisoners after they are convicted and sentenced to some institution for punishment." By the institution of the Juvenile Court and the parole system much, however, had been done in the right di-

Babies Should Always Have Their Regular Sleeping and Eating Hours

Speaking before nearly fifty women in attendance at the weekly Mothers' Clinic of the Children's Homeopathic Hospital, Philadelphia, Dr. Isaac Leopold emphasized the importance of causing babies to observe regular hours of sleep during their early infancy as an aid to future health.

"Many mothers arouse their babies when they arise, sometimes very early in the morning," said Dr. Leopold. "The baby will then want to sleep during the morning and afternoon. In many cases the baby will, then, refuse to sleep until late during the night. At three months of age a mother should start shaping the baby's habits so that it will sleep at certain fixed hours of the day. These hours should be arranged so that the child will be sleeping while its mother is busy with household duties. Mothers who assert that they can not get their work completed because of a fretful child will then have nothing to complain of.

"Just as important as regular hours of sleep are fixed times for feeding the baby," continued Dr. Leopold. "Mothers should not give the baby a bottle of milk just because it is fretful. In the majority of cases the infant is not hungry, but tosses and frets because the bed clothes are not comfortable."

THAW'S STAY LIMITED

The passing of the Thaw case into the hands of the Canadian immigration authorities puts it where it should have been in the first place. It makes easy the return of Thaw to the United States without more delay. In ordering the release of Thaw from Sherbrooke jail, on the writ of habeas corpus, Mr. Justice Hutchinson took the ground that, as the arrest was clearly illegal, the State had no warrant for further detaining the prisoner. The law cannot hold anyone whose commitment has been illegal, even though that prisoner most strenuously desires to stay. Now that the charge against Thaw is that he entered Canada by stealth, thereby violating the immigration regulations, an order for his deportation would seem to be the logical outcome, for there is no question of whether he is guilty or not. If the issue at Sherbrooke leads to Thaw's eviction from Canada within a few days the people of this country will feel well satisfied with the celerity of Canadian justice. The mistake in arresting Thaw so precipitately in the first place, providing room for the use of technicalities in delaying his deportation, is regrettable, but amends have been partially made.
