LATE PETER MITCHELL. The funeral of the later Peter Mitchell, bailiff, took place Monday afternoon from his late residence, Kent-st., at 2 o'clock, service at the house being conducted by Rev. Jas. Wallace, pastor of St. Andrew's church. A large number of friends gathered at the house to view the remains of the departed, and a number of beautiful floral tributes were neatly arranged on the bier.

CATTLEMAN MURDERED

(Special to The Watchman.) MacLeod, Sept. 9.—With a bullet from a revolver through his head James Patterson, one of the most widely known cattlemen in Canada, was found dead on J. Grantlin's ranch, eighteen miles south of MacLeod. It was clearly a case of murder.

Patterson was 62 years old and was born in Texas. He is said to have brought the first big herd of cattle into Alberta thirty years ago.

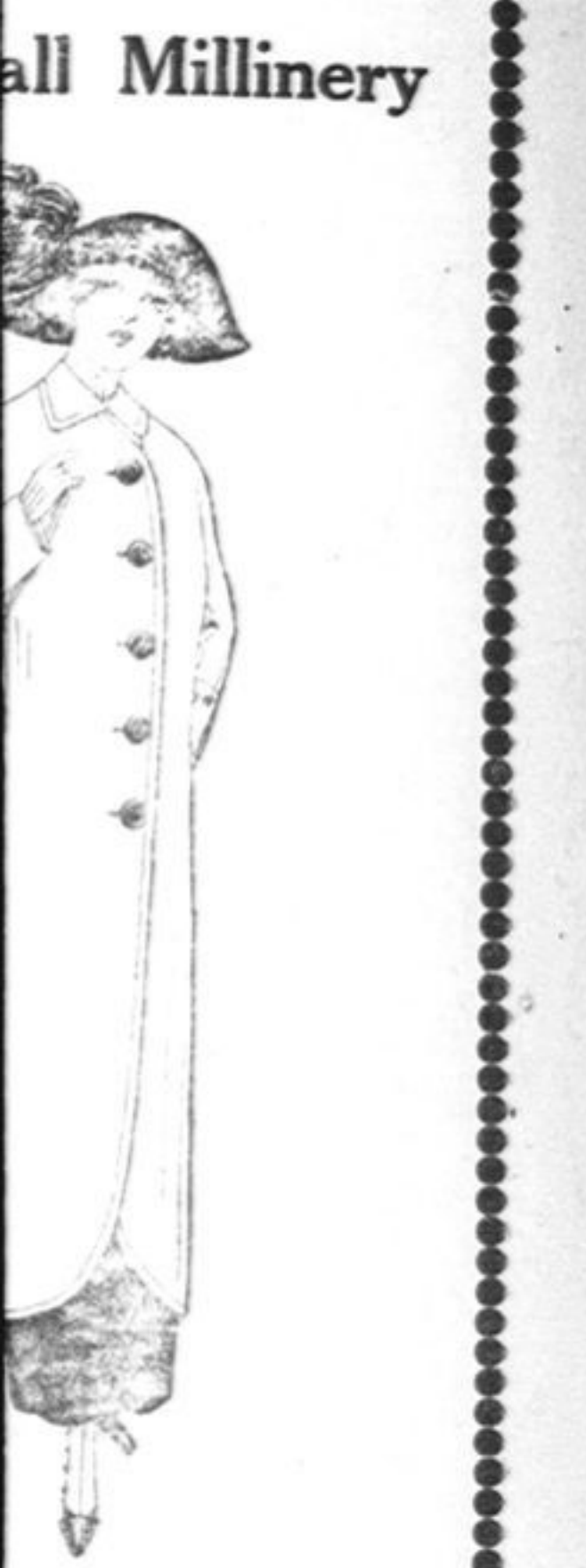
