## MARIPOSA COUNCIL

Mariposa Council, Sept. 8. — The members were all present and the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Mr. George Barry was present and informed the council of a dangerous washout at the corner of lot 5, con. 9, also some culverts on the side road south, required some repairing. Mr. Robt. Hodgins, of Manilla, wished the council to purchase some 12-inch tile for the roadside at Manilla. Mr. Angus Gillies, David Culbert, John Martin and J. J. Sloan applied for the office of tax collector. Mr. Charles Jenkins reports Mr. Samuel Starr having fallen, in the dark, and sustaining severe injuries at the partly built bridge at lot 17, con. 5. The clerk read a communication from Mrs. Hannah Cox, of Rice-ton, Sask., protesting against her portion of the expenses in connection with the Spray drain. Mr. Albert Scott informed the council of having built some 60 rods of wire fence, also that the water from the road allowance was doing damage to his farm. Mr. A. L. Minthorne writes respecting the notice the council gave Mr. Wm. Channon to remove the stones of the road allowance which he placed there. (Mr. Minthorne informs us) for the purpose of taking them to the stone crusher the next time it is in these parts. The reeve remarked that any ratepayer could use the same excuse and make the roadside a dumping ground for all the stones in the township. Mr. A. G. Cavana reports the township part of the Kinghorn drain as being completed. The treasurer reports that the council will require more money to meet all liabilities, and an amending by-law was prepared to borrow an additional two thousand dollars if necessary.

## RESOLUTIONS PASSED.

Motion by Messrs. Edwin Rogers and Charles Jenkins, that the reeve and Messrs. Rich and Ferguson be a committee to meet Mr. Scott and others on the side road between lots 20 and 21 in con. 2 regarding the water running from the road onto Mr. Scott's farm, the meeting to be on Friday, Sept. 26th, at the hour of 2 p.m.—Carried.

Motion by Messrs. Edwin Rogers and Charles Jenkins, that Mr. Angus Gillies be appointed tax collector for the north half of the township of Mariposa for the year 1913 at a salary of \$50.—Carried.

Motion by Messrs. William Fich and Neil Ferguson, that Mr. David Culbert be appointed tax collector for the south half of the township of Mariposa for the year 1913 at a salary of \$50.—Carried.

Mr. George Martindale rendered accounts aggregating the sum of \$94 for men and teams working on the

grader, which were ordered paid. Mr. David Yerx rendered accounts aggregating the sum of \$385, which were ordered paid.

Several overseers turned in small accounts aggregating the sum of \$40, mostly for overtime on their statute labors, which were ordered paid.

The township also paid accounts aggregating the sum of \$649, including the sum of \$233.56 for tile for the Spray drain, which will be repaid by levying on the several persons interested in the drain.

By-law 721 was passed appointing tax collectors, and also by-law 722 authorizing the reeve and treasurer to borrow an additional \$2,000 to meet current expenses if found necessary. Mr. Anson Walton was appointed poundkeeper in the village of Oakwood, and then the council adjourned till the second Monday in October next.

The exhibits were of a very high standard, showing industry and enthusiasm on the part of the pupils. A long sport program proved very exciting owing largely to the interschool competition. S. S. No. 6 Ops, the visiting school in which Miss Brady is teaching were the winners of the larger number of points in the sports, but S.S. No. 2 Ops, with Miss Bertha Nichols, as teacher, carried the red ribbon for the best school display.

## DEATH OF CRIMEAN VETERAN LATE SAMUEL TUCKER

One of the pioneer citizens and builders of the town of Lindsay passed away on Friday at 10.15 o'clock in the person of Samuel Tucker, a Crimean veteran, and one of the most highly respected residents of the town. For several years past the deceased, who passed away at his home on Durham-st., had been living a retired life, and death at his age of 83 years, was not entirely unexpected. In his prime he was an active and industrious citizen, and one who saw Lindsay bud forth from infancy into a full grown town. He was born in Devonshire, England, in 1831.

A SOLDIER AND SAILOR  
If space permitted many exciting and interesting stories of war could be told, Mr. Tucker having been a British soldier and sailor. He was in the navy at the time of the Crimean war, when Russia undertook to force its right of protection on the Turks, and England interfered. He was captain of a pivot gun on board the "Conqueror" for four years, most of which time the vessels were stationed in the Mediterranean Sea and the Black Sea.

CAME TO CANADA.  
In 1862 (51 years ago) he came to Canada to make his fortune. At that time the steamships, which were the only means of communication between America and the continent, were not fast, commodious vessels like we have nowadays, but small steamships of no great speed, which took from ten days to two weeks to cross the Atlantic, a trip which was exceedingly perilous at that time.

SETTLED IN BOBCAYGEON.  
Mr. Tucker first settled in Bobcaygeon, and after a short sojourn there started farming in the township of Anson, where he remained for a couple of years. He then returned to Bobcaygeon, where he started as a contractor and built a number of stores which are still standing. Two years later in 1865 he moved to Lindsay, where he lived ever since. Lindsay has now a population of eight thousand, but at that time the population was not much over the 1,000 mark.

The town was then a small village along the river from Flavell's grist mill, and from there across the river near the Baker Lumber Company's office, and proceeded along the west bank scattered throughout a wooded and swampy country.

THE BIG FIRE.  
The big fire which swept out most of the town occurred about one year before Mr. Tucker moved here. What now is known as Victoria Park was at that time a dank, woody swamp. Kent-st. also was at that time composed of a few scattered stores and public houses. The G.T.R. branch line to Lindsay was at that time only eight years built, and did not come west of the river, but ran along the east bank to the station, which was then across past Parkin's mill (now belonging to Mr. Carew.)

and on northward the same as the present line. The G.T.R. station was moved to its present site shortly after, when the station across the river was burned.

BUILT IRON BRIDGE.  
Mr. Tucker was the contractor of the iron bridge, and he helped also to build the present line, which runs through what was then a boggy, swampy and stumpy land.

BOBCAYGEON AND FENELON FALLS IN 1870.  
In 1870 Bobcaygeon and Fenelon Falls, which are to-day two thriving towns, were composed of a couple of log houses and an inn or two and were closed in by great depths of forest and wilderness.

BUILT A NUMBER OF STORES.  
A large percentage of stores on the south side of Kent-st. were built by Mr. Tucker for Mr. Keenan, most of them being still in good condition.

FIRE AT BRITTON'S.  
Mr. Tucker well remembered a fire which took place at Britton's store. The whole store as well as the adjoining building very narrowly escaped being burned. Mr. Tucker's experience at this fire was one that he never forgot. To get at the fire and save the contents it was necessary to get in a window, and as the heat was so great and the smoke so dense, no one cared to do so, until Mr. Tucker stepped forward and volunteered to go if anyone would follow. He no sooner got inside than he was overcome by the heat and smoke and he was obliged to crawl along the floor on his hands and knees in a semi-conscious condition, and managed to struggle to a window, which he smashed and fell in a fainting condition in the open air.

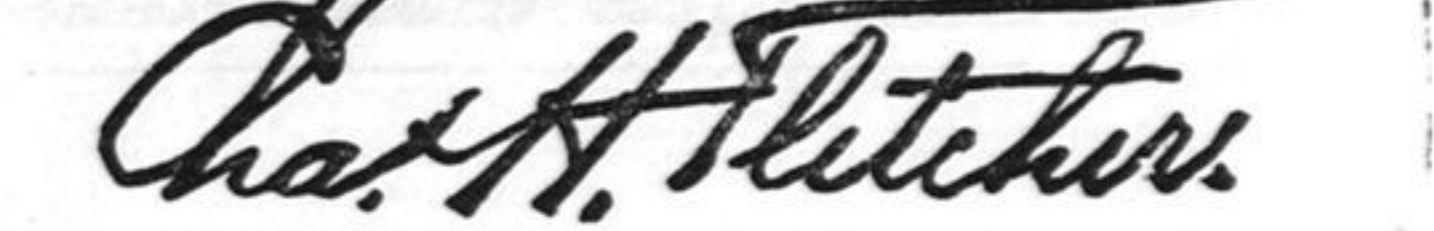

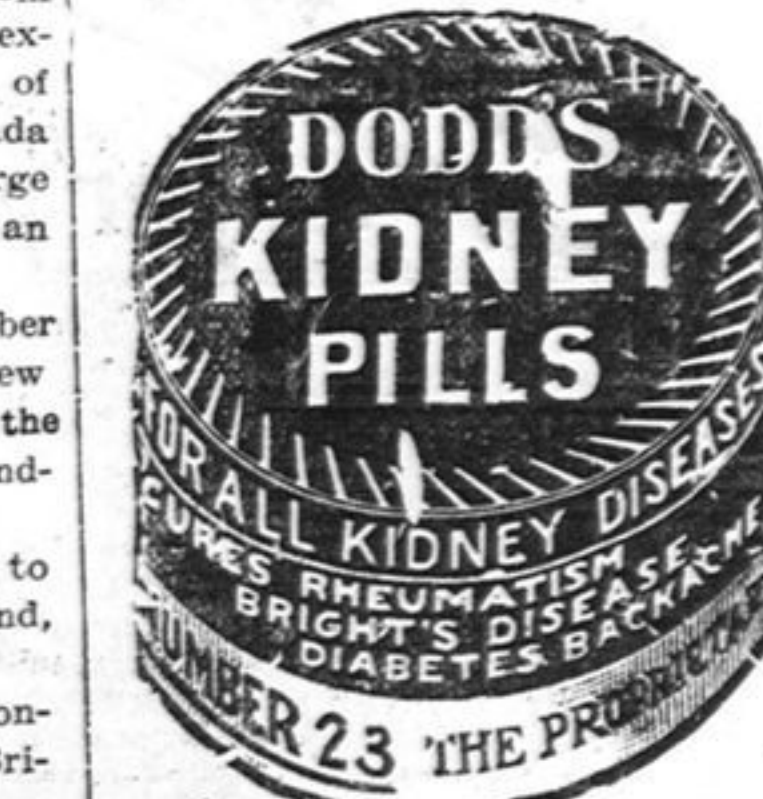
