A Critical Situation.

Notwithstanding the reports of two engagements in which the British were supposed to have crushed the Boers, the latest despatches indicate that so far was the enemy from being crushed that they have returned to the attack in such force as to drive the British commands back upon headquarters at Lydamith.

The Boers have shown themselves foes worthy of British mettle, and their use of artillery and the rifle is astonishing in its accuracy. It may be sincerely hoped that by sheer force of numbers that do not repeat Majuba Hill at Lydamith. News will be anxiously awaited.

Editorial Notes

IN THE MAYOR'S announcement of the committee appointed to confer with the council regarding the water-works he refers to them as representatives of the different wards. It would be better to avoid reference to such divisions when they really have ceased to exist.
