Mallon his Canadian manager. Mr. Ruddin's modest offer is for two million birds That means he wants all he can get. He is stated to have several million pounds of capital behind him. Another enterprise, it is said, has been launched, the purpose of which is to take advantage of the high prices for fowl on the English market in spring.
