A RESTAURANT ENIGMA.

Why Are Side Tables Patronised More Than the Center Ones?

Why is it that most persons when entering a restaurant will seat themselves at one of the side tables in preference to the center tables? If this idiosyncrasy of restaurant patrons has never attracted your attention just note the appearance of your own restaurant when next you have occasion to go there before the midday rush sets in.

Almost every side table will be taken by one or more persons, while of the center tables scarcely one will boast of an occupant.
