MR. TARTE DISMISSED

By his advocacy of high protection Mr. Tarte kept everybody guessing throughout the summer months.

In his dismissal, Mr. Tarte has only received the merited penalty of his course. The very injudiciousness of that course was one of its most puzzling features.

There was nothing else for the premier to do but to dismiss such a minister. Nobody can blame Mr. Tarte for holding his high tariff views, nor for pressing for their adoption by the cabinet.

Mr. Tarte is a clever man; he is an enthusiast; he is a protectionist; he is a Conservative. He holds sound Conservative views on the tariff, that the Conservative party has been stating all too feebly of late.

That party needs the enthusiasm for high protection and the courage in advocating it, that Mr. Tarte would bring to it if he joined its ranks. It is likely he will join them, for in them is his consistent place; and if he does, his present dismissal may yet have large results in the leadership and fortunes of that party.

OUTRAGE NEAR CHIPPEWA.

Man Robbed and Then Laid on Trolley Tracks to Die.

Niagara Falls, Oct. 21.—Another outrage has been committed near Chippewa, this time on the lonely road leading on to the Duffin Island bridge, on the upper river in the southern limits of Queen Victoria Park. About 6:45 last evening, as Mason Logan, 23 years of age, an employe in the Carbone Works at Niagara Falls, N. Y., was returning home on his bicycle, he was struck down by a man with some heavy weapon, knocked completely in on sidors and robbed of \$23.

His body was afterwards placed on the rails of the Niagara Falls Park and River Railway. As the 7:30 car from Chippewa, in charge of Conductor Moyer, came along, Motor-man McNally noticed from the headlight of his car the body of a man lying across the rails. He stopped the car, and, with the conductor, found Logan cold on the rails, and apparently dead, with his bicycle along side him. He was taken aboard the car, which ran rapidly down to the upper steel arch bridge office. He was taken inside, and rubbed with willing hands till signs of life began to return. Dr. McGarry was called and the man was restored sufficiently to tell his story in effect as above.

LAURIER WELCOMED.

The Capital City Enthusiastically Greets Sir Wilfrid.

PLEASURE OF HOME-COMING.

Unfeigned Delight at His Return Showed by Citizens of all Shades of Political Opinion—Guards' Band Plays "Home, Sweet Home"—Addresses Presented, to Which the Premier Replies.

Ottawa, Oct. 20.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier is in the Dominion capital once more, after an absence of exactly eighteen weeks and three days. He reached Ottawa Saturday night, and the unrestrained enthusiasm of his welcome must have greatly intensified the pleasure of his home-coming. Citizens of all shades of political opinion showed unfeigned delight at his return. They gathered in hundreds around the Central Station, although the streets were swept with pelting torrents of icy rain, and when the Premier appeared they raised cheers so deafening as to almost drown the notes of "Home, Sweet Home," played by the Guards' Band. The cheers were renewed as the Premier drove up to the city, and when he appeared to the gaze of the crowd packed within the Council chamber the glad shouts of welcome fairly made the rafters ring.

The Premier's Party.

The Premier was accompanied in his journey to the capital by Hon. W. S. Fielding, Hon. James Sutherland, Hon. Sydney Fisher, Hon. Wm. Gibson, Mr. W. C. Edwards, M. P., Mr. Henri Laurier, his brother, and Mr. Rudolph Boudreau, his private secretary. Lady Laurier arrived at Ottawa by the noon train, but went down again to the station to meet her distinguished husband.

Addresses of Welcome.

The informal welcome over, the Premier was driven to the City Hall, which was attractively decorated with bunting in honor of the occasion.

Arriving in the Council chamber, Sir Wilfrid was given the place of honor on the Mayor's right, Lady Laurier being seated on his left. She carried a bouquet presented by Ald. Payment.

An address of welcome from the Ottawa City Council, handsomely illuminated and framed, was first read, and a brief address in French from the Hull City Council followed.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's Reply.

A little attenuation of the face revealed the strictness with which Sir Wilfrid has been dieting himself, but the elasticity of his gait, the bright-

ness and vivacity of his glance, and the vigor of his speech soon dispelled the idea that he is a sick man. The Premier lost no time in demonstrating that he is anything but an invalid, and his declaration that he was a well man and had come back to work evoked a thunderous outburst of cheers. He made a brilliant response to the two addresses.

Sir Wilfrid, in reply, made happy reference to the pleasure it gave him to be home again. He was glad to be in Ottawa, and said it would be his home permanently. While he did not anticipate a change of government, he would be glad to settle down to his life of a private citizen of Ottawa.

Sir Wilfrid announced that he was in good health and anxious to get back to work again.
