### MURDER AT THE "SOO"

Unknown Italian Shoots Two Bridge Workers and One Dies.

### THE MURDERER HAS ESCAPED.

Lizzie Lemorie, Who Lived With the Italian, Has Been Held by the Authorities Pending an Investigation—Robbing and Attempted Murder on the Chippewa Road—Other Crimes and Fatalities.

Sault Ste. Marie, Oct. 21.—John E. Griffith, an iron worker for the Canadian Bridge Company, whose home is believed to be in Canadaigua, N.Y., and Peter Cragen, of Montreal, Que., employed by the Canadian Bridge Co., were both shot yesterday by an Italian name unknown. Griffith died from effects of the shot he received. He is a man of a out 25 or 27 years of age. Cragen, it is thought, will recover.

The shooting took place just outside the town limits in a section known as Malenville, in a shack set by an Italian, and one Lizzie Lemorie, who lived with him.

The deceased, Griffith and Peter Cragen, and the murderer, went into the house kept by Lemorie, and after partaking more or less freely of a keg of beer on the premises, got into some misunderstanding, which resulted in the murder of Griffith and the wounding of Cragen, by the Italian.

The murderer immediately made good his escape.

The woman, Lemorie, also started for Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., where she was arrested and brought back, and is detained by the authorities pending an investigation.

### OPS COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

A regular meeting of Ops Council was held on Monday, 20th inst. All members were present. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

**Guarding Against Drifted Roads.**  
Mr. Albert Newman was present and desired to know if the Council would pay him 35c per rod bonus for a wire fence he was about to build along the east end of his farm; if not he would remove the posts and leave the rail fence. The place being prone to drifting, the Council instructed him to build the wire fence and grade the ground, as required by law, and he would get the 35c. bonus.

**Sundry Drainage Matters.**  
Mr. Jas. Robertson, owner of west half lot 15 con. 6, said he and Mr. Thos. Simons were putting in a 5 inch tile drain at a cost of about \$100 from his place northward to the creek, and as the road would be much benefited by it he thought the Council should bear at least \$15 of the expense. On motion of Messrs. Sluggitt and Hawkins, \$12 was granted, the Council having the right to tap said drain.

Mr. Sluggitt said that complaint had been made to him about the road ditch bordering on John Lyndon's farm being very deep and dangerous to public travel. He was told by Mr. Lyton that if the Council provided suitable tile for the ditch they would put it in and fill in the ditch. The place is dangerous and should be attended to at once. Mr. Arksey moved, seconded by Mr. Hawkins, that Mr. Sluggitt procure suitable tile and see that the place is repaired to prevent possible accident.—Carried.

**Mr. Geo. Connor, tenant on the Fee farm, wanted an outlet or two into Drain No. 1 across the 3rd concession line. The old road ditch had been filled in by contractors, which shut off the outlet at the s.w. part of the farm, which is lower than the road. He had put in a plank culvert himself, but it was swept away by the freshets. He had to pay taxes and should have the benefit of the drain. The Reeve said that it wasn't the duty of the Council to drain farms, but to drain the roads. The outlet on the Fee farm is north of the place complained of by Mr. Connor. If the culvert next the Oakwood road were deep, it would relieve Mr. Connor. On motion of Messrs. Sluggitt and Hawkins the Reeve was requested to give Mr. Connor an outlet.**

Mr. Richard Darke called the attention of Council to a misplaced culvert on the 4th con. line at lot 25, which conveys the water from the west side of the road into his place, and to a drain leading to said culvert that diverted the water from its original course onto his place. The Reeve explained that Mr. Darke's case had often been before the Council, and told Mr. Darke his only alternative was to proceed under the Ditches and Watercourses Act and bring on the Engineer.

Mr. Sluggitt said he had paid \$49 for work on Manvers boundary and that Manvers Council is liable for half that sum. The Clerk was on motion instructed to notify the Clerk of Manvers accordingly.

Mr. Tlexton, owner of n. h. 11, con. 6, said he had come to ask the Council to have 90 rods road ditch from his gate to Hartnett's corner cleared out this fall, if possible.

the water had backed up in his drains. He had contributed \$10 to obtain an outlet. If it could not be fully cleaned out and enlarged the sticks and long grass and weeds should be removed at least, to let some of the water off. Mr. Hawkins moved, seconded by Mr. Arksey, that Mr. Sluggitt endeavor to have said ditch improved as soon as possible.—Carried.

Several of the fathers of Drain No. 1 were present to compare their respective portions of work of maintenance, but owing to the large quantity of water in the drain at present it was decided to defer the clearing out till next summer, except however a piece near the upper end of the main drain, which, it seems, has not been completed and holds the water back to the detriment of Mr. Ellis's tile drains leading into it. Mr. Sluggitt moved, seconded by Mr. Patterson, that the Reeve and Commissioner Arksey endeavor to improve the part of Drain No. 1 complained of by Mr. Ellis this fall, if possible, so that his tile drains may have the desired effect.—Carried.

The Clerk reported that Mrs. Overt said she would have Stoney Creek irrevocable across her farm this fall if practicable, on condition that William Moore would also clean out his portion of said creek. He also reported that Mrs. Morrison, owner of W. h. lot 20, con. 9, refused to spend any money in putting in a drain across her land for the accommodation of others.

After passing two charity accounts the Council, on motion of Messrs. Arksey and Sluggitt, adjourned to meet on Monday, Nov. 17th inst. at the usual hour.
