

# DR. VROOMAN EXPLAINS MOTION TO HAVE HALIBURTON DROPPED

### We had Fair Play and an Extra Conservative Riding in View - Was Backed by his Party

Dr. Vrooman was in town on Saturday and in reply to a question as to his motion to separate Haliburton from Victoria county in the redistribution of ridings, he said:

"I am very glad to discuss that matter with you in order that I may make clear my position on a question upon which the two Conservative members from this county took opposite sides in the House. I am satisfied that the motives from which I acted will justify my course in the opinion of all fair-minded men. My reasons were two, and briefly stated are as follows:

In the first place, I moved to separate Haliburton from Victoria because fair play to both demanded that it should be separated from it. I first moved that Haliburton and Victoria be made two ridings and be given two members. That would have been fair on the basis on which the government claimed to be proceeding in the redistribution; for together, Victoria and Haliburton have a population of 38,500, or three times as many as West Northumberland, for instance, which gets a member. I did all I could to get two members for this territory. When that was finally refused, I at once protested against leaving the whole territory with only one member, and moved that Haliburton be put with some other riding. It admits three other ridings with from 10,000 to 15,000 less population than Victoria has. It adjoins West Peterboro with 17,000, East Peterboro with 19,000 and Muskoka with a few thousand more. When that was the case, why should it not be joined to one of them instead of to Victoria with its 32,000? My contention is that it should be, and that to bunch 38,000

people and give them only one member is unfair both to Haliburton and Victoria. It is the principle of the thing and the interests of the people concerned that I kept in mind. I would not be a party to getting either Haliburton or Victoria less representation than they would get if used as well as the other ridings. That the 13,000 people of West Northumberland should be given as much representation as the 38,000 of Victoria and Haliburton is outrageous. My stand was not against Haliburton as some have represented it, but in its behalf, for whether as part of this riding or another I want its people to get fair play and representation on the same basis as other places. I think the mere fact of being attached to Victoria is poor compensation to the people of Haliburton for being bunched into a riding with three times the population that another has. I suppose they would rather have fair play than attachment with Victoria or any other riding. I tried to get it for them.

My second reason for moving to separate Haliburton from Victoria was a political one. I wanted to give the Conservative party another seat. Haliburton has a Conservative majority of over 200. Without Haliburton Victoria is conceded to us by the government. East Peterboro and Muskoka are Liberal. Haliburton attached to either of them would have made it Conservative and hence given us another seat. As a Conservative I was not indifferent to that fact, and in my endeavor to bring about that result I had the support of the party. The Liberals, of course saw the point and to save the ridings I have mentioned for themselves, bunched Haliburton's 6,000 in with Victoria's 32,000 to make the most flagrant example in the Dominion of redistribution injustice. I at least have the satisfaction of knowing I was loyal to the rights of the people, and the interests of the party and will abide by the results.

THE BRITISH COLONY. Five Hundred Actual Settlers in the Barr-Lloyd Reservation. Mr. A. J. Gay arrived in Edmonton on Monday from Lloydminster, Britannia. Mr. Gay and his partner, Mr. A. Still, have been granted the contract for grading twenty-five miles for the Canadian Northern through the British colony. They have also secured an option on fifty additional miles of grading if they can handle it. In Mr. Gay's opinion the Canadian Northern should be complimented on granting this contract, which will provide ample work for both men and teams this fall. The railway starts in the colony, going twenty-five miles east towards Battleford from the fourth meridian. Mr. Gay is confident that the Canadian Northern will have their line graded through to Edmonton by next mid-summer. The rails will be laid as far as the British colony by August, 1904, and on through to Edmonton before the snow flies.

The committee, of which the Rev. Mr. Lloyd is president, which took over the affairs of the Rev. Mr. Barr, have everything arranged most satisfactorily. There are five hundred actual settlers on their own land at the present time and all are greatly pleased with Western Canada. Through the instrumentality of the Rev. Mr. Lloyd six thousand additional settlers are expected to arrive

in the colony from the Old Country next spring. The present extent of immigration is but a drop in the stream which will follow in due course. The business men of the colony are now making arrangements to get down \$100,000 worth of supplies and provisions for winter consumption, before river navigation closes. These goods will be stored at Fort Pitt this fall and teamed to the colony in the winter. This will give employment to many of the colonists during the winter months. All the railway supplies will be shipped down the river from Edmonton. Mr. Gay is at present waiting on a carload of scrapers, which have been shipped from Winnipeg for Edmonton for over six weeks. The colonists are adapting themselves to their surroundings and are thrifty and industrious. Mr. Gay has lived west of Winnipeg since 1878 and he says that the land at the colony is excellent, particularly around the east of Birch Lake, where there are at present excellent opportunities for homesteaders. The land is well watered, free from scrub, but with some fairly good timber.—Edmonton Bulletin.
