## Town Council Meet

### Machine Telephone Co. get Franchise—Another Claim by Mr. J. Macdonald

At the regular meeting of the town council on Monday the members in accordance with the request of the Board of Trade, and other citizens, passed the by-law granting a franchise to the Canadian Machine Telephone Co. for twenty-one years commencing from Jan. 1st, 1907.

Mr. John Macdonald put in a claim of \$700 for damages to the Benson House tile floor, which damage was supposed to have been caused through the water draining of York-st., and thereby injuring the foundation of his property.

A notice of motion to introduce a by-law taxing all troupes coming to Lindsay was moved by Ald. O'Reilly, seconded by Ald. Geo. McFadden. The appointment of a tax collector was referred to the Finance Committee. Ald. Begg made a suggestion that as the taxes in Orillia were collected by the chief of police, it might possibly be done through the local chief.

On motion of Ald. Begg, it was agreed that no advertisement of any kind be placed in the fire hall or any other municipal building.

Now, however, we have it for certainty that the firm of McDiarmid & Weeks have succeeded in purchasing




