> The Horse Industry of Ontario

INVESTEGATION BY THE DE-PARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

At the last session of the Legislature the Minister of Agriculture secured an appropriation for the purpose of making an investigation into the condition of the horse industry in the Province of Ontario. This work is now being undertaken by the Department of Agriculture Ontario, and will be commenced early ib October. The object of this investigation is to obtain information to be used in deciding as the best policy to adopt to encourbetter class of horses.

Following are the principal points which will be considered in course of the investigation

1. The number, type, quality and breeding of stallions and brood mares in the Province.

2.
