# Bank of Montreal SETTLEMENT DID NOT SETTLE

Conference of Premiers Leaves Several Questions Open-British Columbia Not Agreed-While Other Provinces Ask for More—Senate Reform Forgotten.

#### SIR WILFRIDS' TROUBLES

The conference of Provincial Premiers with Sir Wilfrid Laurier has come to an end with the implied promise of the Dominion Government to concede to the provinces better financial terms. The increases to be allowed amount in all to \$2,372,000. This arrangement gives effect to the resolutions of Mercier's inter-provincial conference at Quebec 18 years ago. FINAL. Mr. McBride asked that the claims of British Columbia be referred to the commission of three, one appointed by the Imperial Colonial office. Sir Wilfrid objected to leaving anything unsettled. Both he and his friends of the provincial delegations objected to this reference. Yet it does appear that the agreement is a final settlement-even of financial transactions between the Dominion and Provinces. Not only has British Columbia still a demand unsatisfied, but the Eastern Provinces have financial claims respecting fisheries. It is not officially stated that the special mands for a division of the fishery award have been abandoned.

OTHER MATTERS UNSETTLED. Outside of financial terms there are many unsettled questions which remain. There is the boundary of Manitoba, which is a question also affecting Ontario and the new Provinces. A conference on this question will held next month. There are matters of conflicting jurisdiction in the control of the fisheries. Water-powers are so under provincial and federal control as to make it difficult for either party to legislate in regard to them. The whole area of liquor legislation and of legislation respecting the Lord's Day has become so involved in concurrent and conflicting au thority as to make any laws on these subjects of uncertain validity. It was understood that the conference would deal with some of these matters, bu they were not touched.
