Y.M.C.A. MARATHON THIS AFTERNOON

Good Prizes Offered. Many Competitors Entered. A Good Course. Two-and-a-half Mile Run for Juniors Five Miles for Seniors

Under the able direction of the new secretary, Wm. R. Cook, and the new physical director, J. J. Thompson, the Lindsay Y.M.C.A. has taken on new life and promises to progress and expand into a going concern that will do good morally, physically and mentally to the young men of Lindsay.

A visit to the Y.M.C.A. building will convince anyone of the enterprise and effort made to make the building a comfortable home for the young men of town and district. Effort is being efficiently made in all directions to benefit and entertain the young men and thus offer practical and drawing counter attraction to the forces and associations that tend to drag down and degrade.

At this time, space is lacking to describe to any extent the efforts made to provide wholesome, healthful amusement, good reading, proper entertainment, educational advantages, etc. Yet these lines are being well looked after.

In the line of training men physically, the Y.M.C.A. has always been active. They believe a sound body, a well developed healthy physique, is one step toward health of heart and mind.

The big Marathon road races to-day (Thursday) were organized for the benefit derived from the training necessary and because they formed a wholesome counterattraction to less pleasing sports and employments.

The course for the races which start from the Y.M.C.A. buildings this afternoon at 2.30 will be at follows:—

Boys' race—To end of Kent street, and down Little Britain road, 1 1/2 miles from here and return. Total distance 2 1/2 miles.

Senior Race—Over the same course, only 2 1/2 miles down, and return. Total distance, 5 miles.

The records made will be official as the course will be properly measured and time correctly kept. A new 5-mile record is expected to be made.

COMMITTEES OF COUNCIL MEET

TRANSACTION OF MUCH ROUTINE BUSINESS, DISCUSSION OF PROBABILITY OF DEFICIT, "THERE SHOULD BE NO DEFICIT," THE OPINION OF COUNCIL.

The several committees of the Town Council met on Wednesday evening last. Mayor Vrooman, Steve Begg, and Aldermen J. G. Eyras, G. McLaughlin, B. L. McLean, and I. E. Weldon were present.

Mr. Murdock, an expert from the Northern Electric and Manufacturing Company, of Montreal, was heard by the Council in regard to the proposed installing of an electric fire alarm-striker. Mr. Murdock said his company would install a system of this kind for \$340. The device would be attached to one of the town bells, and would strike the equivalent of a 900 lb blow on the bell. On a clear day the striking of the bell could be heard at a distance of about three miles. The system would sound the number of the box from which the alarm came, and would repeat the same three times. This system would do away with the necessity for tappers in the homes of the firemen. The latter would be the more costly. Mr. Tilly, manager of the local Bell Telephone Co., was present with Mr. Murdock, and Driver Bell of the fire brigade, was also in attendance.

On account of the financial condition, the Council could not see its way clear to purchasing the system at this time, although it was felt to be needed, and though all were favorably impressed. The Council, however, very strongly recommended the system to the incoming Council, and a motion of such recommendation was carried unanimously.

The tapper at Mr. Bessor's will be transferred to Chief Bell's house in the meantime. The cost of transference will be about \$5.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT MEETS NOVEMBER 28

THE DELAYED SESSION A WEEK LATER THAN LAST YEAR, AND THE REASONS. LAURIER THE UNREADY.

The Canadian Gazette issued under date of Oct. 23rd, contains a proclamation, which, stripped of its verbosity, simply means that the Dominion Parliament will meet on November 28th.

This date, says our Ottawa correspondent, is a week later than last year. Very little business was done last year before the Christmas holidays. Mr. Fielding delivered his budget speech containing the new tariff bill, which was then withdrawn for repairs and heard of no more for nearly two months. On the 18th of December the House adjourned until January 9th. The House was in session before Christmas only three full weeks. If the Christmas adjournment is made at the same time this year there will be only two weeks work before January. It seems hardly worth while to call the House together and start the machinery for so little work, especially as the pay of the whole parliamentary staff begins when the House meets, and continues right through the vacation.

LAURIER THE UNREADY.

The delay takes place because the Government is not ready with public business. Though the fiscal year closed seven months ago, only two of the departments have issued their report. When the members come together at the end of next month, they will for the first time have before them the blue books which they should have had opportunity to study for three months before Parliament. One reason that so little business is done in the early part of the session is that the Government is never ready for business. Another is that the private members are obliged to spend the first half of the session obtaining information that ought to be available when the House meets. The Public Accounts Committee cannot get to work until it has the Auditor General's report, and the departmental accounts which are obtained after the examination of the Auditor's statement. Consequently the session is usually a third over before the financial investigations begin.
