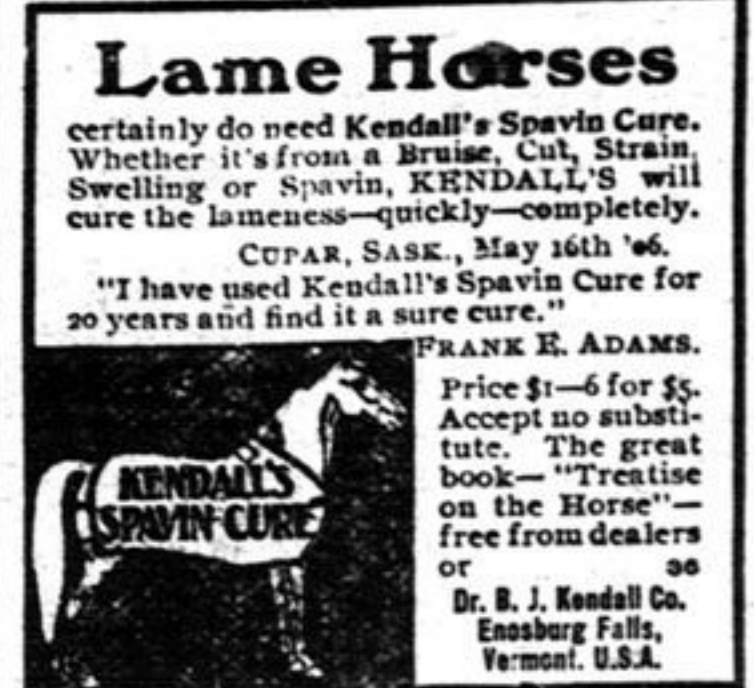

Hark to the tale of truth as sweetly told by The Peterborough Examiner: Here's something to be thankful for. This morning, Mr. P. G. Walker, of Indian River, brought to the Examiner office two mangolds, weighing together thirty pounds. They were two of a batch of twenty which nineteen seeds produced, and ten of the twenty weighed 182 pounds, an average of over thirteen pounds each.

Mr. Walker has met with splendid success in his garden this year, as the above will indicate. He also stated that he had grown beets which tipped the scales at sixteen pounds.
