After New Station—Runaway—Other Items

Omeme?, Oct. 11.—The village council held its regular meeting on Monday, 4th inst.

Emily township council held its meeting on Tuesday, 5th inst.

It looks like a station for Omeme. The following gentlemen constitute a representative railway commission: Reeve Jos. T. Beatty, of Omeme; Major Evans, of Omeme, representative of the Board of Trade; Mr. G. R. Boates, reeve of Emily, and Mr. Geo. A. Jordan, Warden of Victoria county. These gentlemen will confer at Toronto, on October 12th, with the powers of the Grand Trunk Railway regarding the Omeme station. The villagers are weary of the double system—the platform and the junction station—and hope that a settlement will be reached whereby one of these will be cancelled, and it is unnecessary to comment on the tired feeling of the junction station. Our town has given a bonus to the G.T.R. and expect a little convenience in return. May it be that we are to have a real, comfortable station erected in or near the centre of our town and forever definitely settle the issue!
