PENETRATING THE UNKNOWN

How Canada is Being Geographically Explored.

Year by year the area of "unknown" territory in the far north...

Mr. Joseph Keele left Ottawa nearly a year and a half ago with instructions to penetrate the country...

Reference to photographs taken by Mr. Keele showed that for the ascent of the Ross river, a wild, turbulent stream...

The water was spent in the mountains. Mr. Keele had only two men with him after making camp.

"We left winter quarters on February 1," he continued, "and sledged across the watershed range down towards the Mackenzie slope of the Rockies...

Most of the country through which the Gravel river flows Mr. Keele describes as rugged and mountainous, the plain country not being reached until within twenty miles of the Mackenzie.

As to the climate, Mr. Keele encountered lots of snow, especially on the divide and eastern slope.

The distance travelled by the party afoot and in canoes, on the exploration trip was nearly a thousand miles.

From Dawson to Mr. Keele's winter camp on the headwaters of the Pelly the distance is 500 miles.

RURAL MAIL DELIVERY

Will be Put in Force in the County of Victoria

The rural mail delivery, which is to be put into effect throughout Ontario, will be in operation in Victoria county at once, according to Mr. Rudolph Lemieux.

Such person shall provide and erect a box known as the "King Edward" mail box on the roadside, located in such a manner as to be reached by the courier without dismounting from his vehicle or horse.

The price of the boxes, together with all the necessary fittings, except only the post on which it will be erected, cannot be determined at the present time, inasmuch as the price will vary materially depend on the number of boxes required.

Any person living off the line of travel of a rural mail courier is at liberty to purchase and erect one of these boxes at the cross-road or any other point on the courier's route for the reception of matter addressed to him or mailed by him as the case may be.

In addition to carrying the mail to the various post offices on his route the courier will, therefore, be required to receive from any postmaster on the route any mail matter that may be entrusted to him outside of the usual mail bag, and shall carry such mail to and deposit it in the proper rural mail box placed on the line of the route for this purpose.

ELDON STALWARTS ARE "IN LINE"

Enthusiastic Meeting in Col. Hughes' Interests

One of the largest political meetings ever held at Hartley was held last night, when the hall was packed with the stalwarts of that portion of Eldon.

Child Died of Neglect Buried In Back Yard

County Constable N. S. Smith, of Donald Station, was in town lately, and is the authority for the story of the death of an infant in Dysart township, Haliburton, by neglect and starvation early in the week.

The father of the infant is Edward Lindsay, who works at the Wood Product Co., at Donald, in Dysart. The constable heard of the baby's death from several sources, and he communicated with Dr. Giles, coroner, of Haliburton.

Dr. Giles pronounced death to be due to starvation and neglect. The body of the child was taken to Getler where proper interment took place.

The child was two months, sixteen days old, and its death caused considerable feeling in the neighborhood.

No action has been taken by the police yet, Constable Smith having jurisdiction in Victoria county alone.
