Another Man Mixed Up In Volberg's Affairs

Chief Vincent received the following communication this morning from Charles D. Hemming, Scranton, Pa., inquiring for particulars regarding the drowning of Philip Volberg in the Scugog river in Lindsay on Sunday, July 23. He also inquires about his wife who left with the deceased and Mrs. Fernstein on July last and has not yet returned.

The letter speaks for itself, and is as follows:

Chief of Police, Lindsay, Ont.,

Dear Sir,—In looking over the files of the New York American, I come upon the account of the death by suicide of Philip Volberg at Lindsay sometime ago. It was a shock to me as the deceased has been missing from Morristown, N.J., since July last.

He was an admirer of Mrs. Sarah Bernstein, a hair dresser of that place and was supposed to have eloped with her to Canada on the date mentioned. With them went my wife, Jean Mae Homming, (formerly Miss J. M. Beck, of Dover, N. J.). She was also alleged to have eloped with one Hyman, a friend of the deceased. I am a newspaper man of good standing. My wife was led astray, I am sorry to say, and from that date until this I have been unable to trace her.

My object for writing this letter is not for the purpose of asking you to help find her, but if you will be so good as to show this letter to the newspaper men of Lindsay that they may be able to send me an account of the suicide. I want to break the news to a relative here who knows nothing of it. I am yours truly,

Final Meeting of Victoria County Teachers

The final meeting of the Teachers' Association was held Friday afternoon when Mr. D. Walker, B.A., Peterboro, concluded his remarks on the subject of arithmetic, speaking on "Percentage and Commercial Arithmetic for Senior Grades."

Before dealing with the topic, the speaker explained a few methods, and advantages that were overlooked in his previous discourse, the number "o" was one of the hardest numbers to teach. Other numbers may be taught by producing objects, but it is hard to think of the abstract "o". Again, a child is apt to use the expression when questioned, "I haven't any," instead of, "I have none, n't any," instead of, "I have none, naught," and there is a difference. The child should be corrected, showing him the character that represents naught or none. The subject for discussion was part of the rational or problem stage, and was very closely connected with fractions which should be commenced in the primary classes.

Before introducing percentage a thorough review of measurements and fractions should be taken up and changing of a fraction of one denomination to any other denomination until the denomination 100 is reached. Then the term percentage given with the character.

After percentage is taught, difficulty is met in teaching the commercial arithmetic, such as interest, commission, stocks, etc. This is largely due to the inability of children to understand the facts. To overcome this, the problems used should be simple transactions that can be carried out by the children themselves. For example, interest for money might be spoken of as rent for the same. In teaching this simple notes or receipts might be made out by two of the scholars in the class, and the processes made perfectly clear.

The difficulty in stocks lies in the fact that they are not thoroughly understood by adults. There are two values for stocks, the par value (or given value) and the market value (or selling value). Every transaction should be made clear as to its nature and the standard of comparison.

In conclusion, Mr. Walker stated that he hoped he had given some information that would be of benefit to some of the teachers present and that the staff of the Normal School is always at the disposal of any teachers in the district.

A hearty vote of thanks moved by Mr. D. McDougall, and seconded by Mr. J. M. Simpson was tendered Mr. Walker for his instructive addresses given during the convention.

The following gentlemen led in the discussion that followed: J. Rogers, T. C. Rennie, T. W. McLean, and Mr. Walker.

The subject of promotion examinations that was left over from the morning session was left to the teachers who are to send their views in the matter to the Inspectors, Mr. W. H. Stevens and Mr. G. E. Broderick.

WIFE SLAYER MUST DIE

Rufus Weedmark Is Sentenced to Hang at Perth.

Man Who Came Home Drunk, Choked His Wife to Death and Boasted of "the Good Job" He Had Made of It, Pleads That He Did Not Realize What He Was Doing—Wife Threw a Teapot at Him.

Berth, Oct. 13.—After being out three-quarters of an hour the jury yesterday afternoon found Rufus Weedmark guilty of the murder of his wife. The murder of this woman, Kate, an illegitimate child, was committed on the morning of the 11th inst. at the residence of the prisoner, who was sentenced to hang at Perth on the 11th inst. for the crime.

Dr. Stammers swore Weedmark stated to him on the fatal morning, just after he had choked his wife to death by the throat and nose, "I said to her, 'I did not make a good job of it, doc, eh?' She would not send him down any more, her mother and other neighbors talking lies about him. Witness found marks on the throat and windpipe."

Alex. McLaughlin recounted how he had heard Weedmark and his wife quarreling. "Weedmark started to assault her," said McLaughlin, "and told him he was a coward to strike a woman. He then desisted. Weedmark did not appear to have been under the influence of liquor."

Evelyn Weedmark, a daughter of the prisoner, is 14 years of age; she gave her evidence in a clear voice, though her manner was naturally subdued.

"During the night, about 4 o'clock," she said, "I heard my mother screaming and ran downstairs. Father was holding her by the throat and had his hand over her nose."

"Did you try to do anything?"

"Yes, I tried to pull him off, but he told me to stop."

"What did you do then?"

"I ran out side and yelled."

In reply to Mr. Foy, she said that her father had been drinking, but he was not "good and drunk." Her father had accused her mother of having been bad with Amos Allan.

WILL "TAKE IN" DOGS.

The hunting season will soon be making preparations for the annual cutting after the best of foot. In Lindsay the hunters are anxious to know if they will be allowed to take their hounds into the woods on the FairRoads, owing to recent legislative rulings. However, a warden inspector interviewed the two Lindsay agents of the carrying companies in regard to the matter and they stated that up to the present no instructions had been received to the contrary, and the hunters will likely be allowed to take along their dogs as usual.

When called up by phone Mr. T. G. Matchett, uptown agent for the C.P.R. stated: "I think the old law is still in force. I have had a number of hunters inquiring about the matter and as I have not received instructions to the contrary, that are different from those I received the first of the year. We cannot ship dogs to or through Toronto, but can to points north by Orillia."
