Woodbridge fair Wednesday, the 2.50
class, 2.15 pace, and a race for far-
mers. The latter was won by
James McCracken's bay gelding,
Lucky Jim, after Carlo W. had won
the opening heat. Little Fred won
the 2.50 class and Otto K. had no
difficulty beating Planet in the fast
class. Mr. Smith sold Otto K. dur-
ing the afternoon to Dr. Young, V.
St. of Sudbury.

An effort will be made to form a
circuit of ice racing points to in-
clude Toronto, Port Perry, Lindsay,
and Peterboro. With dates ahead
of Ottawa this would surely be a
boon to horsemen who intend racing
during the winter.

OLYMPIC LAUNCHED.

Belfast, Oct. 20.—The White Star
trans-Atlantic Str. Olympic, the
largest vessel in the world, was
launched to-day from Harland and
Wolfe shipyards. The Countess
Aberdeen, wife of the Viceroy of Ire-
land, christened the liner.

More than 40,000 persons were on
hand to see the monster 40,000-ton
ship take the waters.

The Olympic and her sister ship,
the Titanic, to be launched next
February, are the White Star's an-
swer to the Cunard's Mauretania and
Lusitania.

The Olympic is 840 feet long with
a 90-foot beam. Her speed will be
twenty knots an hour.

was less successful than in 1909 or
even 1908, and appears to have
reached the limit of her speed.

City Solicitor, who came from Lind-
say, has resigned. He claims he can-
not work with the City Engineer.

SHOT HIMSELF.

Toronto, Oct. 21. — Leaving a note
alleging domestic troubles as the
cause, John H. Fell, aged 51, a civil
engineer, shot himself dead in the
lavatory at 15 Toronto-st., yester-
day afternoon. Fell is a married
man and had been employed with
Somerville's, Limited, engineers sup-
pliers.

WILL LINK OCEAN.

St. John, N.B., Oct. 20. — C. M.
Hays, president of the Grand Trunk
Pacific Railway, at the banquet
given in his honor by the St. John
Board of Trade to-night, declared
that he believed trains would be run-
ning over the entire road from At-
lantic to Pacific within three years.

"It will be much sooner than you
realize," he said. He added that
the port of St. John would become
one of the very best on the Atlantic
coast, but warned the people that
work of development must be started
on a greater scale without delay if
facilities are to be provided for all
the freight that will come here when
the Grand Trunk Pacific gets into
operation.

HARRY LINDLEY'S HUMOR.

The following article in the Strat-
ford Beacon no doubt refers to the
time when the editor, Mr. W. M.
O'Bierne, lived and worked in Lind-
say:

Harry Lindley, the comedian, who
closed a week's engagement on Sat-
urday at the Griffin Theatre, is prob-
ably the oldest actor in Canada. He
has been playing off and on through-
out Canada for 35 or 40 years, and
must be over 70 years of age. In
the early days he had a repertoire
company, and used to make three
nights and week stands in the town
halls with more or less success, and
always with indomitable cheerfulness.
The writer, as a boy, remem-
bers going to collect an advertising
bill from him in an Eastern Ontario
town some 35 years ago. The weather
was very cold, and business was
wretchedly poor. There was only a
dozen or two people in the hall, sev-
eral of whom were "deadheads."
The till was almost empty.

The stage manager came out and
asked what bill would he put on for
the night.

"We'll play 'All for Love,'" ex-
claimed Harry, and looking down
into the till he added, "for, God
knows, its not for money."

Before coming to Canada, Harry
Lindley had earned the reputation of
being one of the best low comedians
on the English stage. He still pos-
sesses much humor in that line.

Berlin, Oct. 19.—Prof. Andreas

EXCITING RUNAWAY

A rather exciting time occurred on

ely run for freedom. The wagon
was left at the car door to be loaded
and the driver had gone for a shovel
when from some source the team
took fright, tore around the mill and
down Peel-st. At the corner of Cam-

Vrooman's lawn but took the road
again, after trying the grass for a
few yards, and continued on down
the street to Dr. Broad's where
they came to a halt.

When the team started Mr. William
Mulherne, who has been working
with the driver, was standing on
the wagon. Mr. Mulherne was
thrown forward to the ground and
the front wheel of the wagon ran
over him. With the exception of a
few scratches and a shaking up, he
was not seriously injured.

TURKEYS SCARCE.

Ottawa, Oct. 18.—The Dominion
Government, which proclaimed
Thanksgiving on the 31st of this
month, is now at work trying to
save the holiday from disappoint-
ment by reason of the extinction of
the necessary Thanksgiving turkey.
Dr. Charles Higgins, Dominion bi-
ologist, states that the high price of
turkeys is not the result of a com-
bine, but is due to a great mortal-
ity among turkeys all over Canada,
caused by a parasitic and contagious
disease known as "blackhead."

The disease, which manifests itself
by black spots on the comb, is rag-
ing throughout the Dominion. The
only efficient remedy so far discover-
ed is to starve the bird for 48
hours, and then administer a diluted
solution of acetic acid, a tea-
spoonful of acid to a quart of wa-
ter. Dr. Higgins, however, is at
work upon some plan by which the
disease may be stamped out or con-
tagion prevented. The disease is re-
ported from every province of the
Dominion.

Bullion Thief Gets Seven Years

North Bay, Oct. 20. — Thos. Kelly
Ralph and Thos. Ballantyne, were
convicted at the assize, before Judge
Foster, 18-day of having assisted in
the robbery of \$17,000 worth of bul-
lion from the Nova Scotia Mine at
Cobalt. After evidence had been pre-
sented showing that Kelly had know-
ledge of the crime and had offered to
expose the plot if the reward was
doubled, the accused went into the
witness box and flatly denied every-
thing. The jury deliberated two
hours before returning their verdict
of guilty, which was accompanied by
a recommendation of mercy in the
case of the Ballantynes.

His Lordship said he was convinced
that the Ballantynes had been duped,
and that Kelly had plotted the entire
crime, leading the others into it. He
suspended sentence in their case con-
ditional upon good behavior. Thom-
as Kelly was sentenced to seven
years in Kingston Penitentiary.

EXCELLENT HUNTING.
