Wednesday morning at nine o'clock holy communion was administered in St. Paul's church at the archdiaconal conference.

Canon Marsh—There are some earnest workers who never seem to grow content, occasionally attend, and 25 per cent. advised churches increasing their giving to outside objects by small amounts every year.

Mr. Hampden Burnham, now member of the House of Commons for Peterboro, read an interesting paper on "The Attitude of the Age Towards Christianity."

Lodge says Christian ideal means flooding of human life with outside influences. Science says there is no God in nature—nature to scientists is a purely cold mechanical contrivance.

Take away a man's reasoning power and you reduce him to the position of an amoeba. Salvation is not physical. Scientific instrument is in man's hands and with it men will fall to find God.
