Lindsay Man From -Sunny Italy says That Present War is Justified

In an interview with Mr. S. Fusco, the Italian fruit dealer on Kent-st., regarding his opinion as to the present trouble which has arisen in the far east, says: It has been the evolution of a long series of petty broils between Turkey and Italy. He is not in sympathy with the Turks by any means and claims it is justifiable war on the part of his countrymen who he claims were denied the privileges accorded other nationalities living in Tripoli. The law of Italy provides that all males must serve two years in the Italian army unless through physical incapacity they are hindered from doing so. They can be called for the defence of their country at from 20 to 29 years of age. After that milestone in life is reached they are placed on the reserve force which means that they remain at home and guard the city. On reaching the forty-second year they are exempt from all military duties. Mr. Fusco stated that according to what he has read from Italian papers that Russia and Germany will remain neutral during the trouble. It is probable that Germany may bring about a reconciliation.
On Mr. Fusco being asked by our reporter as to whether he would go home if called upon or not, said he would go to fight for his parents who are still alive. He feels that Italy can defeat the Turks easily.
