"YOU ---- do solemnly promise and swear that you will serve his Majesty truly and fairlifully in the place of his Council in this his Majesty's DOMINION OF CANADA, you will keep close and secret all such matters as shall be treated, debated and resolved on Privy Council withor publishing or disclosing the same or any part thereof, by word, writing, or any otherwise to any perthe same Council, but to such only as be of the Council, and yet if any matter so propounded, treated, and debated in any such Privy Council shall touch any particular person, sworn of the same Council, upon any such matter as shall in any wise concern his loyalty and fidelity to the King's Majesty, you will in no wise open the same to him, bu; keep it secret as you would from any person until the King's Majesty's pleasure be known in that behalf. You will in all things to be moved, treated, and debated in any such Privy Council, faithfuily, honestly, and truly declare your mind and opinion to the honor and benefit of the King's Majesty. and the good of his subjects without partiality or exception 'of persons, in no wise forbearing so to do from any manner of respect favor, love, need, displeasure, or dread of any person or persons whatsoever. in general tyou will be vigilant, diligent, and circumspect, in all your doings touching the King's Majesty's affairs; all which matters and things you will faithfully observe and keep as good Councillor ought to do, to the utmost of your power, will, and discretion-SO HELP YOU GOD "


