Petertoro Examiner : Peterboro citizens will be grieved to learn of the sudden death at his residence of Mr. John Sawers, one of the oldest Cab- best known and most highly respected residents of the city. Mr. Sawers was found dead in bed at 16 o'clock Thursday morning, and, from all alpearences, had been dead since Monday night of this week. In the absence of his wife, who is very ill and under the care of a nurse, at the home of her brother, Mr. Sawers had been living alone. He was last seen down town on Monday. 
