He was kept busy judging, but from what he heard, stated that the exhibits in every department were well up to the mark. In fact on the whole he claims the fair was the best one he has attended this year. However, it should be mentioned that he was unable to be present at

The horses were of the finest quality and the competition was exceedingly keen. After visiting the fairs at Lindsay, Peterboro, Port Hope and Bowmanville, the horsemen in the above districts wind up at Millbrook, so that in a manner Millbrook fair becomes the battle ground for the prize winning animals. His task was a difficult one but all who know Mr. Channon know that he was equal to the occasion, as he ranks as one of the best judges in the Province.

WANT TO HAVE TURKS EXPELLED
 St. Petersburg, Oct. 5.—The departure from this city last night for the front of the Bulgarian officers of the Imperial army, which originally was a Christian church, should support them for weal or woe. A Serbian priest blessed the departing soldiers and bade them expel the Turks from Europe and reinstate the cross upon the mosque of St. Sophia in Constantinople, which originally was a Christian church, should support them for weal or woe.

Border Traffic Suspended.
 Constantinople, Oct. 5.—All passenger and freight traffic has been suspended between Constantinople and Mustapha Pasha, which is situated on the Maritza River on the border of eastern Rumelia, and Dedeagah, the terminus of the railroad from Adrianople and Saloniki on the Aegean Sea.

Wires Are Silent.
 London, Oct. 5.—The wires from the near eastern capitals last night were somewhat ominously reticent or altogether silent. A brief despatch announcing that railway traffic had been stopped between Constantinople and Mustapha Pasha and Dedeagah and confirmation of the news that Bulgarians had crossed the Turkish frontier was practically all the information of a military nature received in London yesterday and shows that the telegraphic censorship is active.

Six Months For Passing Stolen Money
 Toronto, Oct. 4.—Six months in the Central Prison was the sentence meted out to Walter Davis by Magistrate Denison yesterday morning. The charge was bringing stolen money into Canada. Alice Davis, wife of the accused, was discharged.
 On Aug. 9 the couple were arrested in the Palmer House by Detectives Cronin and Mitchell after bills, known to have been part of a theft of \$150,000 from the New Westminster branch of the Bank of Montreal, had been traced back to them. The robbery occurred in September, 1911.
 When arrested they had in their possession \$9,299 in bills, over \$2,000 of it corresponding with the numbers furnished by the bank of the stolen money.
 P. J. Robinette, K.C., entered a plea of guilty for Davis, but asked mercy for the woman, saying that she acted under her husband's dictation.
 Counsel stated that Davis had found the money in a lumber pile in Port Huron. How it got there he would not say.
 The money found on Davis when arrested has been turned over to the bank.

War Soon Over-Turkey Settles With Italy
 Constantinople, Oct. 5.—That the Turkish Cabinet voted on Thursday to accept Italy's latest proposals for peace, was the announcement made yesterday from an authoritative source.
 The preliminary agreements are to be signed upon the arrival at Ouchy of a special Turkish emissary, who left Constantinople immediately after the Cabinet meeting Thursday.
 Partly Confirmed.
 Paris, Oct. 5.—Confirmation of the report from Constantinople that the conclusion of peace between Turkey and Italy is imminent, is contained in a semi-official note issued here yesterday based on an authoritative advice from Italy.

Would Ensure Peace.
 London, Oct. 5.—The Daily Mail says, editorially: "If peace with Italy were signed the gain to Europe would be immense. The Balkan crisis would vanish like a nightmare at the break of day, and the standing temptation to the young and ambitious peoples of the Near East would be removed."

 A sad accident occurred at the G.T.R. station at Simcoe yesterday, when Gordon Benn, 15 years old, the son of Silas Benn, of Courtland, was instantly killed by a freight train.
 Arthur Babcock, a Hydro-electric fireman, fell from a pole at Galt yesterday morning, a height of 30 feet, and landed on his side, partly on the sidewalk. He escaped serious injury.
 That theatres can be opened on Sunday for any ordinary purpose which is not theatrical was the opinion expressed in the recorder's court by Recorder Weir in Montreal yesterday.
 Robert Scott, aged about 45, crawled from his bed in Grace Hospital, Toronto, last night, and before he was missed, climbed over the balcony railing, falling a distance of 70 feet to the ground. He died a few hours later.
