## Montenegro Declares War on Turkey

London, Eng., Oct. 8.—Montenegro has declared war on Turkey. The declaration of war was delivered to the Porte early to-day.

Montenegro troops, according to reports received here, have already crossed the frontier and heavy fighting is in progress.

Montenegro's action in declaring war on Turkey forestalled the action of the European powers in favor of peace by only a few hours. It is thought likely the other Balkan States will follow Montenegro's lead and throw their armies into Turkey to fight in favor of those of their kinsmen and fellow Christians, whom they declare have suffered from Turkish oppression.

## Disgraceful Row--Constable O'Hara Had Night Encounter

A scandalous row took place on taking one of his men to the lock-up, Kent-st. last night about 8 o'clock, followed by a howling mob who appeared in which four young men figured, who have previously had a fighting reputation.

The trouble started at a Kent-st. hotel over the loss of a \$2 bill, the quartet becoming so boisterous in the bar that night constable O'Hara was called in. On attempting to arrest his man he was interfered with by three others on coming out of the hotel and roughly handled. Although many prominent citizens stood around and saw the disgraceful actions of the men who kicked the officer, none essayed to grant assistance.

The night constable used his baton freely on one of the outlaws, who went away howling like a whipped cur.

The actions of the citizens who stood around and permitted the night constable to be abused should be censured as it is understood many were there who were able enough to make peace had they wished to render assistance.

A warrant will be issued by Chief Short for the arrest of the man who escaped from the constable.

Later—At Tuesday's police court one of the offenders who resisted Constable O'Hara in arresting the noisy disturber, was fined \$14.50. He pleaded guilty to the charge.

## Lindsay Armouries to Cost \$90,000 --Contract Not Yet Awarded

Several days ago the Lindsay press contained a despatch from Ottawa concerning the new armouries, which are to be erected in Lindsay. It was stated that Contractor Bogue, of Peterboro, had secured the contract for \$30,000 or more.

At the time it was thought that a mistake had been made, but owing to the absence of Mr. John Carew the article could not be certified to. However, in conversation with Mr. Carew this afternoon he stated that after reading the article in question he immediately telephoned Capt. Hughes, Kingston, who informed Mr. Carew that the con-

tract for the local armouries had not been handed out as yet. Further that the new buildings would probably cost \$90,000.
