The Laurier Meeting
As will be remembered by Lindsay citizens Hon. Mackenzie King complains that Conservative newspapers are not adequately reporting the many meetings addressed here, there and everywhere, by himself, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and others. The whole thing reduces itself to a question of news value, says the Toronto World. No newspaper, Liberal or Conservative, would be foolish enough to refuse to print any item of news.

Mr. King will probably admit that if he, Mr. Murphy, Mr. Fisher and Mr. Graham made four speeches a day for a hundred days the performance would not excite any widespread interest or merit any newspaper space. There is no campaign going on and the people assume, without being told, that these four ex-ministers would like to get their jobs back.

Sir Wilfrid is the national figure. Were he to retire and become a sage he might, from time to time, influence the country greatly by his counsel. So long as he is a partisan trying to recover power his utterances carry little more weight than the arguments of any other politician. The people of Ontario have decided the reciprocity question, and they will not pass on Mr. Borden's naval policy until it is announced by Mr. Borden. Meanwhile Sir Wilfrid is not adding to their wealth of information on this subject. We do not remember that the Liberal papers, a year or two ago, refused advertising matter in order to have more space for reports of the Borden meetings.
