PRESENTMENT OF GRAND JURY

Public Institutions Receive Words of Commendation

May it please Your Lordship:

The Grand Jurors of our Sovereign Lord the King assembled at the sittings of the High Court of Justice for the County of Victoria, beg to make their presentment as follows:

1. The county gaol was visited, and the conditions were found to be satisfactory. There were three prisoners, one the man against whom they found it their duty to present a true bill on the charge of murder; the other two are men who are undergoing sentences for vagrancy. One of the latter is an old and infirm person, whose sentence will expire in the course of a week. They would suggest that he be sent to the place in which he says he has friends at the expense of the county. The other man is somewhat defective, both mentally and physically. He was an inmate of the House of Refuge, but absconded several times, and on the last occasion fell into the hands of the police. They would suggest that the gaoler and turnkey be provided with suitable uniforms, and that the floors of the lower corridor and the gaoler's office be covered with proper material.

2. There is nothing further to be said respecting the House of Refuge, which was visited and inspected, than that the whole premises, both the house and farm, by the excellent condition in which they were found reflect great credit upon the official in charge of the institution. Of the present number of inmates is 51, made-up of 35 men, 15 women and one child.

3. The Ross Memorial Hospital was visited. The institution, by its excellence of equipment and the superior service rendered to the pa-

tients has taken such a hold upon the community as to make it indispensable.

4. The lockup in the Town of Lindsay is under the fire hall, and they are of opinion that the location is undesirable, because of the fact that it is reached by a number of steps down from the surface of the ground. All of which is humbly submitted.
