Sacrificed Her Life For Her Son. Detroit, Oct. 29.—Informed by the Superintendent of a Detroit institution that her two-year-old boy could not be admitted to the place unless he was an orphan, Mrs. Mabel Green, formerly of Toronto, whose real name is said to be Mabel Potter, shot and killed herself in a rooming-house at 42 Abbott-st., to-day.

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At the home of Rollin Green this evening his wife died absolutely that Green had ever been married to Mabel Potter, and said the whole affair was the outgrowth of a mad infatuation on the part of the girl.

PENITENTIARY. Picton, Oct. 29.—Wesley Palmer and Herbert Henderson were sentenced to fourteen and seven years, respectively, in the penitentiary by Chief Justice Falconbridge for a terrible crime committed against Miss Julia Allison, aged seventy-three years, in the end of July, in the Township of Sophiasburg.

The two men went to her home, on Lot 10, on Big Island, twelve miles from Picton, at 2 o'clock in the morning, broke the telephone wires, and while one held the aged woman the other assaulted her.

The case was investigated by Inspector H. Reburn, of the Provincial force.

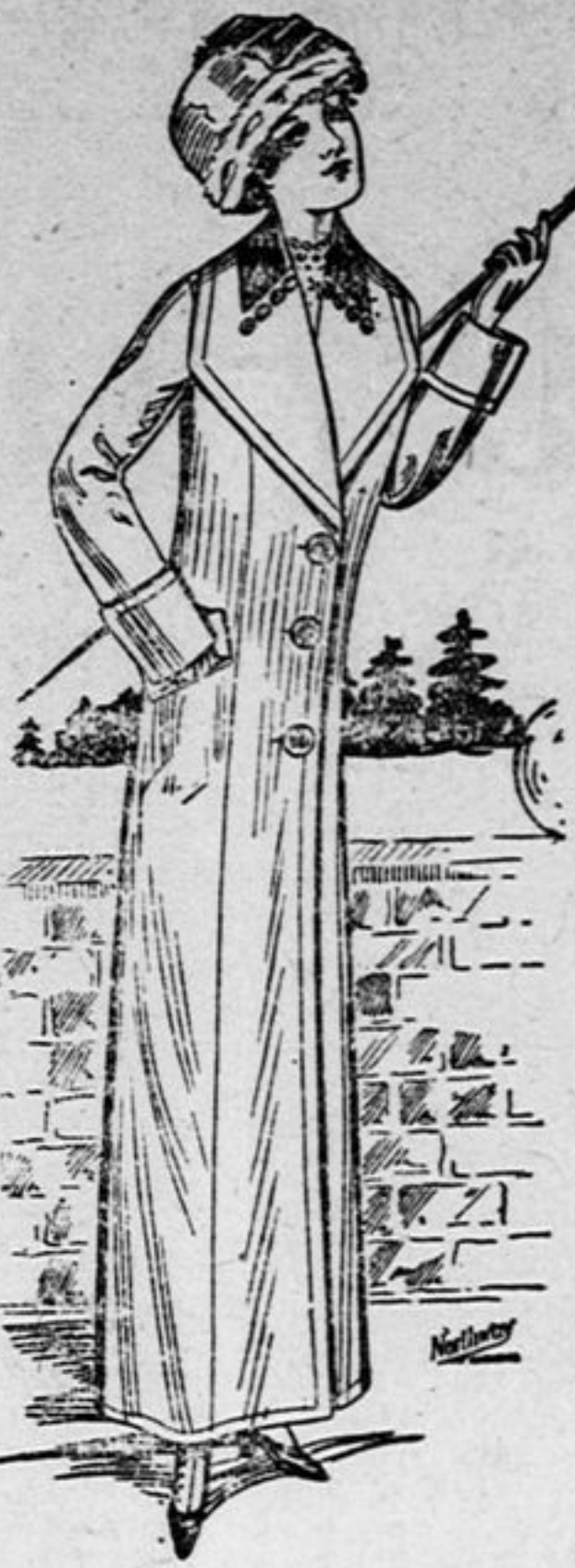
