Detroit, Oct. 29.-Informed by the Superintendent of a Detroit institution that her two-year-old boy could not be admitted to the place unless he was an orphan, Mrs. Mabel Green, formerly of Toronto, whose real name is said to be Mabel Potter, shot and killed herself in a roominghouse at 42 Abbott-st. to-day. Rollin A. Green is said to have been legally married to his present wife in England seven years ago.
