

After being lost for two years it was discovered and salvaged by the Polson Iron Works, Limited, of Toronto, was reconstructed by them and purchased by the Department of Public Works in 1908. At the time of its purchase it was rechristened the "Quebec," this name being printed on the vessel. Last season it was renamed P. W. D. 17, the change being necessitated by registration. 
