 Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 1.—A controversy has arisen over the alleged changing of the name of a dredge Sir Wilfrid Laurier to P. W. D. 17. The dredge was never known to the Department of Public Works as "Sir Wilfrid," it was originally constructed about 1904 for the W. J. Poirer Company, Limited, and was lost in a storm in Lake Ontario while being delivered to them. It was then known as the "Sir Wilfrid Laurier." After being lost for two years it was discovered and salvaged by the Polson Iron Works, Limited, of Toronto, was reconstructed by them and purchased by the Department of Public Works in 1908. At the time of its purchase it was rechristened the "Quebec," this name being printed on the vessel. Last season it was renamed P. W. D. 17, the change being necessitated by registration.
