### SPINAL MENINGITIS RESULTS FROM TUSSELS.

St. Catharines, Oct. 7.—An injury to Hugh A. Dorsay, a fourteen-year-old colored boy, nine days ago, resulted in his death yesterday from spinal meningitis, the lad's back having been hurt while tussling with some other lads in a playground with a Rugby football.

### ESCAPES DROWNING BUT ARM DISLOCATED.

Chatham, Oct. 7.—Mrs. Brown of London, narrowly escaped death to-day in Wallaceburg, when she fell from a dock into the river. She was attempting to enter a boat with her hostess, Mrs. Ed. Taylor, when the accident happened. She was pulled from the water, but in the effort her arm was dislocated. She is under the care of a Wallaceburg physician.

### BRANTFORD MAN KILLED.

Brantford, Oct. 7.—Matthew Condie, an Austrian, 25 years of age, while being a belt in the blacksmith department of the Massey-Harris Co. this morning, was pulled into the machinery and mutilated beyond recognition. The head was severed, the legs and arms were torn from the body.

### ATTEMPTED SUICIDE.

Windsor, Ont. 7.—James J. Murray, the Belleville man convicted last week of passing a bad cheque on the Hotel Dieu here, is being closely watched in Sandwich jail lest he commit suicide. The jail officials are authority for the statement that Murray has made two efforts to end his life since his incarceration, once by eating broken glass and again by hanging. The man is a drug fiend. He will be sentenced Friday.

Of late a number of outsiders have visited Lindsay selling tea, books, chinaware, rugs, etc. They were unmolested until Monday when the Retail Merchants' Association, through the President, Mr. A. L. Campbell, took the matter up. He found that one ten man at least had failed to pay his license, although a promise was made to produce the collateral. Other merchants were spoken to and it was agreed that in protecting the merchants of Lindsay the license should be raised from \$50 to \$200.

With this purpose in view a deputation comprising Messrs. A. L. Campbell, W. W. Staples, A. B. McIntyre, T. A. Fisher and J. R. O'Neill waited on the council Monday night. Mr. Campbell, the first speaker, said in part: "I come before you in behalf of the retail merchants of Lindsay and wish to speak particularly in regard to the transient hawkers and pedlars who are infesting the town. We do not exactly want to interfere with these men, but we claim that the license should be higher, in justice to the local merchants. These outsiders are not called on in any way to support the town, local improvements, etc. But are they called upon to support charitable causes like the home merchants. To a large extent the goods offered by these transient hawkers are not as good as the goods offered by the merchants. We would like to see the license placed at \$200, which covers twelve months. We refer to the merchants as a whole and think they should be appreciated."

Mr. W. W. Staples said: "The retail merchants are heavy taxpayers and also have their hands in their pockets almost daily for some cause or other and they generally respond, while the transient traders leave nothing here. It is very important that the people of Lindsay get the best goods and not have something just as good" pampered off on them. At the same time the merchants should be protected."

Mr. A. B. McIntyre, Mr. T. A. Fisher and J. R. O'Neill spoke along the same lines, asking for favorable consideration.

### Lindsay to be Advertised by Means of the "Movies"

Lindsay is to be advertised throughout the State of Ohio, U.S.A., and other American States by means of the "movies." In other words moving pictures are to be taken of Lindsay's business streets and business places, and also one of the Council in session, the only expense to be incurred by the town being the hotel bill of the operator of the machine for three days, which should not be more than \$6.

A letter was read from the Cleveland Motion Picture Film & Supply Co., certifying that Jos. W. Jones, commissioner of the Canadian Agricultural and Industrial Bureau, has made arrangements with the above firm to send one of their moving picture men to Lindsay to take 50 feet of moving pictures of the business streets, factories in operation, water power and any public improvements desirable.

These films are to be exhibited in the principal cities and towns throughout the State of Ohio and elsewhere in the leading picture theatres.

This modern method of publicity will demonstrate to the manufacturer in a comprehensive manner the manufacturing and shipping facilities of Lindsay.

The only expense Lindsay will incur will be the hotel bill of the operator for three days, the movies to include a picture of the town council in session.

A resolution was passed covering the same, and the town of Lindsay will be placed on the map through the "movies."

### Chas Gibson's Sentence Has Been Commuted

Ottawa, Oct. 7.—The prayer of the sixty thousand petitioners that the Government would interfere at the eleventh hour to save Charles Gibson from going to the gallows in Toronto on Thursday next has been answered. To-night it was announced that the sentence had been commuted to life imprisonment. It is believed that later on a new trial will be secured, and if the expected new evidence materializes, Gibson should then become a free man. His escape from the gallows comes after practically all hope had been given up, following the definite refusal of the Government last week to recommend executive clemency.

RECONSIDERS DECISION.  
This morning Gibson's counsel, Mr. Herbert Lennox, K.C., M. P. P. for North York, with the Toronto deputation, again appeared before the Cabinet Council and urged as strongly as possible the plea for a favorable reconsideration of the application for clemency. At this afternoon's sitting of the Cabinet the whole case was again gone into thoroughly.

It was finally decided that the decision of last week should be overruled, and a recommendation was made to the Administrator of the Government, Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, that the death sentence be commuted to life imprisonment. The recommendation will, it is expected, be formally signed by Sir Charles tomorrow.

Mr. Lennox stated to-night that efforts will now be directed towards securing a new trial, and he is hopeful that with expected new evidence this will be granted in the near future.

The Toronto deputation here in Gibson's behalf left for home to-night, well pleased with the result of their efforts. No hope was held out last week by the Government that any petitions or any deputations would be of avail in changing the Government's decision to let the law take its course. The result has proved the efficacy of the final strenuous and spectacular efforts in Gibson's behalf.

### PRISONER ESCAPED.

St. Thomas, Oct. 7.—A young man, aged 29, who was awaiting trial at the High Court jail on a charge of theft, escaped from the jail this morning, and was last heard of at Woodstock. He was wearing the jailer's sash with coat for the winter, and after having been seen to leave the jail, the jailer quickly searched away.

### STORES WILL BE CLOSED.

### Gibson Hears News in Cell

Toronto, Oct. 8.—While official advice that the sentence of Charles Gibson had been commuted did not reach Sheriff Fred Mowat and other local officials last night, Mr. Chambers, Governor of the jail, concluded that he would be justified in communicating to the young prisoner the information received by the Globe.

There was no outward demonstration on the part of the young man when the news was conveyed to him, as he is very unemotional. He made no remark of note. There is no doubt that he was greatly relieved.

When an intimation of the good tidings had been received from Mr. T. Herbert Lennox, M.P.P., who has fought so hard to save his son from the gallows, Mr. Gibson proceeded to the jail and was permitted by Governor Chambers to read the message to his boy.

### HAVE RECORDS.

Chief Thompson is working in conjunction with Chief Chilton of Lindsay, in connection with the Lindsay robberies. He has to-day forwarded to that town the records of Killingbeck and Landry. Killingbeck has been convicted six times previously, mostly for theft, while Landry has a record not quite so black.—Peterboro Times.
