Becker Making a Bid for His Life
Albany, N.Y., Oct. 1.—Sing-Sing's bath-house has contributed an amazing chapter to the story of the impeachment of Governor Sulzer, in which it appears that Lieutenant Charles Becker has prepared evidence striking at the political life, if not the personal freedom, of a dozen men high in the official life of the state.
This story, alleged to be backed by the very best of scientific and resourceful detective might produce, has been taken up by Becker in return for his release.
Never in any of the most weird works of novelists, who revel in time, has such a story been told as his narrative of crime and politics, emanating from the tight little house, where men sit waiting for the tent avenger.
It strikes like an Arizona rattler the very existence of men whose names have been upon the public stage, and it was prepared primarily with a view of supplying Governor Sulzer with a weapon with which to annihilate some of the persons whose political existences his hands deem inimical to his own holding.

GRADE PRISONERS TO AD CONVICTS
Kingston, Ont., Oct. 1.—At the conclusion of the inquiry to-day by the Government Commission into the Kingston Penitentiary, Dr. Platt, the warden, was again a witness. Dr. Platt is firmly convinced that the present system is bad. Segregation and classification of prisoners desirable and necessary, but undesirable without radical changes. On the other hand, the danger of segregation was the tendency of developing vicious habits in the inmates, at the same time applied to board-school life, where a large number of boys of similar age are segregated. Whether criminal or not, these vicious habits are very apt to be formed, he said. He would classify the "prisons" into four grades. Class 1.—The insane, imbecile, imbecile, epileptic, maimed and blind.
Class 2.—(a) Life convicts; (b) convicts; (c) Ten-year men or longer terms.
Class 3.—Incorrigibles, repeat offenders.
Class 4.—First offenders and males.
Partial classification is of course desirable at present.
