Royal Wedding To-Day

(Special to The Watchman-Warder.) London, Eng., Oct. 15.—Prince Arthur of Connaught, son of the Duke of Cornwall, Governor-General of Canada, and Princess Alexandra Victoria, Duchess of Fife, eldest daughter of the widowed princess royal Louise, were married to-day in the ancient chapel of St. James' Palace, where both of them had been baptised. The presents showered upon the couple include jewels in abundance, gold and silver plate, and ancient and modern furniture. One estimate places the total value at \$750,000.

"Suffs" Attacked King Geo.

(Special to The Watchman-Warder.) London, Oct. 15.—Suffragettes to-day attacked the carriage in which King George and Queen Mary were on their way to St. James' palace to attend the wedding of Prince Arthur of Connaught and the Duchess of Fife. One woman bolder than the rest jumped on the steps of the King's carriage and attempted to throw a petition into the vehicle. Police dragged her away and had difficulty in saving her from an angry mob. Other militants succeeded in throwing copies of "The Suffragette" into the carriage, in which Queen Mother Alexandra and the Queen of Norway were riding.

Death List Totals 431

(Special to The Daily Watchman-Warder.) Cardiff, Wales, Oct. 15.—Four hundred Welsh miners are still entombed in the Universal colliery at Singhenydd, wrecked by an explosion early yesterday, and Colpears, inspector of mines, says there is no hope that any of them were alive. Eighteen men were brought out alive during the night, making the total of the rescued about 500. Thirty-one bodies in all have been recovered so far, and the death list is expected to total about 431.

Man Operating In Woman's Attire

A woman, who bore a great likeness to a man in build and swaggering gait, which denoted more haughtiness and superiority than that affected by the ordinary female, emerged from the rear of the skating rink last night about 8.30 o'clock. She carried a large bundle under her left arm, and on arriving at the fence on Russell-st., where she struck the sidewalk, loped over it like a pet deer. From the way in which she made the landscape vanish she seemed to be in somewhat of a hurry, and cut the corners to accelerate her speed. She went west on Russell-st., and was lost sight of around the railway tracks.

Sheldon, of Topeka, Kansas, in an address in Battle Creek, declared that if Christ were to come again He would find an infinitely better world than the one in which He lived, and one which is getting better every day. Dr. Sheldon added that he does not think the trend of women's attire is toward indecency. "The women of Egypt and Palestine were practically nothing," he said. OTTAWA, Oct. 15.—The customs board, on the strength of appeals from rulings of collectors, has made interpretations of the following items of the customs tariff: Under tariff item 663 and in effect from 9th November, 1913; fire brick purchased before 13th May, 1913, and entered for duty prior to 13th of July, 1913, shall be dutiable under the regulations in force 12th of May, 1913. Priry Council Cases. LONDON, Oct. 15.—Six Canadian appeals are up for hearing before the Priry Council this session, including the Toronto & York Radial Railway versus the City of Toronto, regarding appellants' rights to deviate its railway, and the C.P.R. versus Companies regarding the jurisdiction of the Railway Board over freight rates between Canada and the United States. Five Canadian judgments are also to be delivered.

Corn showed a net loss of 3-32 to 3-4c, and oats a drop of 1c to 1 1/2c. In provisions the outcome varied from 17 1/2c decline to an advance of 2 1/2c.

UNION STOCK YARDS. TORONTO, Oct. 14.—Receipts of live stock at the Union Yards were 82 cars, comprising 1471 cattle, 204 hogs, 939 sheep and lambs and 204 calves. Exporters. The Swift Co. of Toronto bought 100 export steers, averaging 1212 lbs. each, at \$7.35, average price.

Good to choice butchers sold at \$6.75 to \$7.25; medium butchers, at \$6 to \$6.50; common butchers, at \$5.50 to \$6; good to choice cows, at \$5 to \$5.65; common to medium cows, at \$4.50 to \$4.80; canners, at \$3.50 to \$4; bulls, at \$4.50 to \$6.25. There were 4 steers, fed by T. A. Russell, Downsview Stock Farm, at 75 per cent. sold by Dunn and Leveck, which was the highest price we heard of, that is for four cattle out of 140 on sale.

Prices for good to choice heavy feeders, 1000 to 1150 lbs., were firm, at \$6.40 to \$6.65; steers, 900 to 1000 lbs., at \$5.60 to \$6.25; steers, 700 to 800 lbs., \$5.25 to \$5.75; eastern stock, net, \$4.25 to \$4.80. Milk and Springers. The demand for good to choice milkers and springers was firm, all offered. Prices ranged from \$50 to \$90 each, the bulk selling from \$50 to \$70.

Receipts were moderate and price firm. Choice calves, \$3 to \$10; good calves, \$8 to \$9; medium, \$7 to \$8; common, \$5 to \$6.50; rough eastern calves, \$4.50 to \$5. Sheep and Lambs. Interviews.—J. Walker, H. Hickson, E. Sanderson, W. Ray, W. I. Reid, I. Downey, in regard to various drainage matters. A. Scott in regard to light at R. R. crossing. Moved by W. Best, seconded by J. Brock, that the applications of John J. Pogue for \$500, and Harry Hickson for \$100, for tile drain loans, and Inspector Reid's reports thereon, be accepted, and that the Reeve and Treasurer be authorized to sign debentures to secure the amounts applied for from the Provincial Treasurer.—Carried.

Moved by G. Maloney, seconded by J. Brock, that Mr. J. Walker's request re road culvert be referred to Com. Best.—Carried. By-law No. —, to borrow from Provincial Government the sum of \$5,000, to be drawn upon as required for tile drain debentures; also By-law No. —, imposing a tile drain rate of \$56.80 per year for twenty years on the west half of lot 10, con. 4, were duly passed.

Moved by W. Walden, seconded by G. Maloney, that T. Downey's request re drainage be referred to Com. Best, with power to act.—Carried. Moved by J. Brock, seconded by G. Maloney, that E. Sanderson's request re drainage be referred to Com. Best.—Carried.

Moved by W. Best, seconded by J. Brock, that the Clerk be instructed to request the C.P.R. to reduce the passenger rates from Hillhead to Lindsay, which are now four cents a mile instead of three cents.—Carried. Moved by G. Maloney, seconded by W. Walden, that W. I. Reid be paid \$6.00 for Ops share of drain constructed by him, on Omeamee road, con. 9.—Carried.

Moved by W. Best, seconded by G. Maloney, that Reeve Robertson be authorized to sign agreement in the Hay-Gunn drain on behalf of the Township, and that W. Walden be instructed to look after the Township's share of work thereon.—Carried. Moved by G. Maloney, seconded by W. Walden, that the Clerk be authorized to publish in The Weekly Watchman-Warder the money by-law borrowing \$5,000 from the Provincial Government for tile drain loans as required.—Carried.

Moved by W. Best, seconded by J. Brock, that Reeve Robertson and Com. Maloney inspect Broad's bridge on the 9th con. line at lot 26, with power to have the same repaired.—Carried. A number of accounts were passed, on motion of W. Walden, seconded by G. Maloney.

Council adjourned to meet November 17th, at 10 a.m.

MARIPOSA COUNCIL

Proceedings Monday, Oct. 13th.—The members were all present. Mr. Dennis Mackin desired the council to clean out a part of the Short drain so as to give him an outlet, but it was shown that Mr. Mackin had signed an agreement with the Engineer to do this work himself, so that the council could not see their way to interfere in the matter. Mr. John DeGeer was present and informed the council that his portion of the Lowsbrough drain was completed, or rather cleaned out, and also that there was about eight inches of water in the upper end of the drain, and about twenty-two inches in the lower end of the drain, this being caused by a bar of rock never being taken out on Mr. Thos. Currie's farm. Mr. Thos. Stewart, township solicitor, and Mr. A. G. Cavana, township engineer, were present to discuss the Percy Brown drainage trouble, and it was finally decided that the Engineer should provide simply an outlet for all the waters converging at lots 14, 15 and 16, in concessions 12 and 13, Mariposa, and that all persons receiving any benefit from this improved outlet should be charged for outlet purposes. This scheme will enable all persons using the drains or creeks emptying into this outlet to take up a scheme for enlarging or improving any of these drains or creeks at any time in the future when they are so disposed to do so.

Messrs. T. H. Watson, of Sea-grave, and Wm. Parrish, of Port Perry, waited on the council to get their co-operation in petitioning the Dominion Government to take such means as will maintain Lake Scugog at a high water level, or at least on an even water level. Mr. Parrish informed the council that the Government had reimbursed all persons along the shores of these waters for any lands that may have been drowned or rendered useless by reason of the water being at high water mark. At the present time the body was a lake for a part of the year and a little better than a mud hole for the balance of the year, and being a menace to the health of the inhabitants along the shore, and also preventing the propagation of fish. Many other reasons were given by Messrs. Watson and Parrish. The Trustees of S.S. No. 8, Little Britain, presented a requisition whereby they desire the council to raise the sum of \$8,190.

Motion by Messrs. Edwin Rogers and Chas. Jenkins.—That the Reeve be hereby authorized to sign the agreement of owners, respecting the drainage of lots 1 and 2 in con. 2, Fenelon, and lot 29, in con. 2, Tps, and being a continuation of the Rogers-Hancock drain at lots 21, 22, 23 and 24 in con. 11, of the Township of Mariposa, said agreement bearing date the 9th day of September, 1913, whereby the council of Mariposa agree to dig, construct and maintain 20 rods of said drain, commencing at stake 5 and extending up to stake 6, and to complete the performance thereof on or before the 15th day of November, 1913.—Carried.

Motion by Messrs. Neil Ferguson and Wm. Rich.—That this council withdraw their approval of the plans of the Grand Trunk Railway Co. for the renewal of Bridge No. 149, being at mile post 31.39, in the 10th district of its railway company, and between con. 4 and 5, at lot 1, in the Township of Mariposa, and that the Clerk write the Secretary of the Board of Railway Commissioners, pointing out and explaining the danger to the public, and asking the commission to send an engineer to examine the premises, and that the Clerk also write the Grand Trunk, withdrawing our consent, and explaining the reasons for so doing.—Carried.

Motion by Messrs. Neil Ferguson and Wm. Rich.—That the requisition of the Trustees of S.S. No. 8, of the Township of Mariposa, to issue debentures for the sum of \$8,190.00, for a term of twenty years, to bear interest at five per cent., be received, and that a by-law be prepared for said purpose.—Carried.

Motion by Messrs. Neil Ferguson and Edwin Rogers.—That whereas the people residing in the neighborhood of Lake Scugog are entitled to the benefit of the navigation system of the Trent Valley Canal; and whereas for many years the water level of Lake Scugog has been allowed to vary very greatly, to the detriment of the interests of all parties residing on the margin thereof, with the result that navigation has been continually impeded, and in a large measure in many places prevented altogether, while at times large areas of mud have been exposed to the great danger of the health of the people; and whereas considerable commercial interests are involved in the summer tourist traffic, which has greatly fallen off owing to the destruction of the fish during winter, when the level of the lake has been very low; and whereas the great variation of the water level has been caused by the unlawful use of water at the Lindsay dam, which has been frequently complained of without results; the Municipal Council of the Township of Mariposa hereby resolves, that it be represented to the Government, on behalf of the said township, that the interests of the residents thereof residing upon or near Lake Scugog require that the dam at Lindsay be taken out of private hands by the purchase thereof by the Government, to the intent that it may be used in the public interest, so that the water of Lake Scugog may be kept at a moderate and even level.—Carried.

Motion by Messrs. Edwin Rogers and Chas. Jenkins.—That By-law No. 723, being a by-law to authorize the Municipal Council of the Township of Mariposa to raise the sum of \$8,190.00, for the erection of a new public school house for S.S. No. 8 of said township, be received, and read a first time in duplicate.—Carried. By-law No. 723 was read a second and third time, passed, signed and sealed.
