COLLEGE HAZERS BEAT YOUNG GIRL

Drag Her to Cemetery, Make Her Dance

Syracuse, N. Y., Oct. 17.—Gagged, smeared with paint, dragged by the hair to a cemetery, made to dance on gravestones and then kicked into insensibility. Such was the terrifying and brutal experience of pretty Elizabeth Anderson, 22, employed at the Phi Delta Theta chapter house. The police are scouring the city for two interlopers who are maltreated the young woman, one of them alleged to be a Syracuse university sophomore. Jealousy on the part of another young woman is said to have prompted the attack.

Here is Miss Anderson's story: "I was in the yard of the chapter house in Walnut-st. on Tuesday evening when a young man ran up behind me, striking me over the head with his fist. I screamed, but my cries were not heard. The man placed his hand over my mouth to stop my outcry. A second man then appeared and dragged me five blocks to the Oakwood cemetery. They blindfolded me and tied my hands. Then they smeared me with white paint, soaking it into my hair and letting it drip over my face, hands and clothes. The cloth over my eyes was then removed and a glass of bitter liquid was given to me to drink.

"Just what the liquid was I was unable to say, but it tasted like turpentine. "I was next ordered to mount one of the monuments in the cemetery. Belting me with the strap, the men forced me to climb to the top of the monument and dance there. This continued for ten minutes. Then I was ordered to jump to the ground.

"Again I pleaded with my captors to release me, but they only struck me with a belt and answered, 'It's just a little fresh medicine.' I kicked one of the men and he returned the attack, kicking me in the stomach. I fell to the ground and became insensible.

"When I recovered my senses, I found my captors had run away. About midnight I found my way out of the grounds, and after walking about an hour to find my home, I finally reached the Chapter House.

"I don't know why they should attack me in that way. The men in this house have always been very kind to me and have made it pleasant for me here, and I cannot believe it was any of them."

BY-LAW NO. 739

A BY-LAW TO RAISE THE SUM OF \$5,000 TO AID IN THE CONSTRUCTION OF TILE STONE OR TIMBER DRAINS.

The Municipal Council of the Municipality of Ops, pursuant to the provisions of the Tile Stone and Timber Drainage Act, enacts as follows:

1. That the Reeve of the said Township of Ops may from time to time, subject to the provisions of this By-law, borrow on the credit of the corporation of the said Township of Ops such sums of money, not exceeding in the whole \$5,000, as may be decided by the said Council, and may, in manner hereinafter provided, issue debentures of the said Corporation in sums of \$100 each for the amount so borrowed; the said debentures to have coupons attached, as provided in Section 5 of the said Act.

2. That when the Council shall be of opinion that the application of any person or persons who may be assessed as owners of land in the said Municipality, to borrow money for the purpose of constructing tile, stone or timber drains should be granted in whole or in part, then the said Council may, by resolution, instruct the said Reeve to issue debentures as aforesaid, and to borrow such sum of money as does not exceed the amount applied for, and may loan the same to the said applicant on the completion of the said drainage works.

3. A special annual rate shall be imposed, levied and collected one and above all other rates upon the land in respect of which the said money shall be borrowed, sufficient for the payment of the interest and sinking fund, as provided in the said Act.
