ANNUAL MEETING.

Moved by John Campbell, seconded by Johnston Ellis, that the thanks of this meeting be tendered to the councils of Mariposa and Ops for the liberal grant given by each municipality towards the funds of the Association.—Carried.

Moved by Capt. Hunter, seconded by J. E. Staback, that we have a plowing match next year.—Carried unanimously.

Resolved, that at any meeting called for business by the president, seven directors form a quorum.

The thanks of the meeting was tendered to the judges for their able services during the day.

Resolved, that a deputation composed of W. B. Graham, president; J. Ellis, vice-president; Messrs. Campbell, W. Jordan, Geo. Lytle of the Watchman-Warder, Geo. H. Wilson of the Post, and the secretary, wait on the county council at the June session and ask for a grant towards the funds of the Association.—Carried.

The meeting then adjourned.

OPS TOWNSHIP COUNCIL

BATCH OF COMMUNICATIONS—ROAD UNDER DISCUSSION—TWO IMPORTANT BY-LAWS

The members of Ops council met pursuant to adjournment on Oct. 30th, at the usual hour; all members present. The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and duly confirmed.

COMMUNICATIONS

From the clerk of Manvers, in reference to repairs on Manver boundary. From the superintendent of the G. T. R., relating to the enlarging of the railway culvert crossing municipal drain

No. 1, lot 24, con. 4.

From G. H. Hopkins, on behalf of Jas. Cayley, urging the closing of a ditch on the west side of the road allowance bordering lot 11, which, it is alleged, diverts the water from its natural course on to Mr. Cayley's land.

Wm. B. Fee again reminded the council that they had a right to open up a street between park lots L.L. and S.S., on lot 23, con. 6, whatever might be said to the contrary, and he hoped they would do so as soon as possible.

As old Mr. Eleworth had, at a former meeting, emphatically asserted that part of the street in question belonged to him the council, on motion of Messrs. Bryne and Currins, decided to place the matter in the hands of the township solicitor, and also the case of James Cayley.

Mr. Peter Kirley, who had claimed compensation for trespass, was then heard saying that his fence had been undermined by road jobbers, and he wanted simple justice done him. Mr. D. Cayley, who was present, said Mr. Kirley was entitled to compensation from some source as there was no doubt about the trespass, which was done since he (Cayley) had been working in the pit.

Mr. Hickson, on being asked about the matter, said he hadn't time to investigate as to who took the gravel, but would endeavor to do so and report at next meeting. Judging by the appearance of the pit about 40 yards had been unjustly taken.

Mr. S. Oliver, owner of the Parker lot, said he wanted to build a fence along the concession line east of his lot, and would like that the reeve or some member of the council would decide on the location, as he didn't want to encroach on the roadway, but would rent a portion of the road allowance for a number of years, yielding up possession any time the council desired to open up same for public travel.

Mr. Currins then moved, seconded by Mr. Calvert, that the reeve view the Oliver lot and road allowance adjoining for the purpose of locating line and letting a portion of the roadway to Mr. Oliver conditionally for a number of years on the terms proposed.—Carried.

IMPORTANT BY-LAWS

A by-law for the reconstruction of municipal drain No. 1, the report of which had been provisionally adopted at last meeting, and on motion of Mr. Thomas Hickson, seconded by Mr. Jas. Byrne, read the first time.

In conformity with a resolution of council on Sep. 25th, that a by-law to raise \$15,000 in aid of the proposed B.L. & P. railway be submitted to a vote of the ratepayers on the first of January next, Mr. Hickson moved, seconded by Mr. Calvert, that said by-law be read a first time.—Carried.

The clerk was, on motion of Messrs. Byrne and Hickson, instructed to write to the superintendent of the G.T.R., accepting his offer under certain conditions.

Mr. Currins moved, seconded by Mr. Calvert, that the court of revision to consider the assessment of municipal drain No. 1, be held on Dec. 4th next, that at least 25 copies of this be typewritten and that the landowners or tenants interested be notified in accordance with the act.—Carried.

Mr. Calvert moved, seconded by Mr. Hickson, that orders be issued for accounts now passed.—Carried.

The council adjourned about 5.30. W. F. O'BOYLE, clerk.
